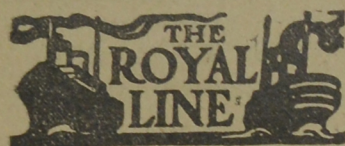

## CITY ELECTION

The Election for one Alderman for Queen's Ward in the City of Fredericton for the current year will be held on Monday the 27th day of May inst. At the following places, Division No. 1—For all voters residing or owning property above the centre line of Carleton Street prolonged, at or near the City Hall in the said City.

Division No. 2—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City, not included in Division No. 1, at or near the County Court House in the said City.

Polls will be opened at the above named places at nine o'clock, a. m., of the said day of Election, and will close of the hour of four o'clock, p. m. of the same day.

Nominations must be filed in the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, at or before four o'clock on Monday, the 20th day of May instant, and must be signed by at least two qualified Electors, and the signatures attested to under oath.

Forms for Nomination may be procured at the City Clerk's office.

A Certificate of the City Treasurer showing that all Rates and Taxes of the Candidate have been paid within the time required by law must be attached to each Nomination Paper.

## A Law Regulating The Sale of Milk in the City of Fredericton.

1. No person shall sell or offer for sale milk in the City of Fredericton without having first procured a license so to do, from the local Board of Health.

2. Every person applying for a license to sell milk within the City of Fredericton shall, with the application therefor, furnish the Board with a declaration in writing that all cows belonging to him which supply milk for the purpose of sale have been tested with the Tuberculin within one month from the date of such application by a veterinary surgeon, recognized as such by the Board, for the diagnosis of tuberculosis and that he will not sell or offer for sale in the said City of Fredericton, any milk procured from any cow which has not been so tested.

3. Every person so applying as aforesaid shall also furnish along with the application and with said declaration, a certificate in writing from an accredited veterinary surgeon, approved by the local Board of Health, certifying that all the cows from which the applicant procured any milk for the purpose of sale, have been tested within one month from the date of such application, with Tuberculin for the diagnosis of tuberculosis, and that the said cows and each and every one of them are entirely free from Tuberculosis, Cow Pox, Actinomyositis, Puerperal Fever, Retention of the Placenta or any other malignant or contagious disease. All certificates from veterinary surgeons shall be on form approved of and supplied by the local Board of Health.

4. And every person owning or keeping herds from which milk is sold in the City of Fredericton, shall, upon making any additions to said herds, have each and every addition properly tested with Tuberculin for the diagnosis of tuberculosis and shall file a certificate from an accredited veterinary surgeon that said additions are free from tuberculosis.

5. And every person selling milk in the City of Fredericton shall have their entire herd of cows properly tested for tuberculosis as before provided, at least once every year, between the first of April and the first of May. Should the Board deem it necessary in the interest of the public health, they can order any or all herds from which milk is supplied to the City of Fredericton to be tested with Tuberculin as before described, twice during the year.

6. Every license to sell milk within the City of Fredericton shall be subject to the condition that the licensee shall and will observe, abide by and perform all the restrictions, conditions and regulations from time to time adopted or enacted by the local Board of Health during the currency of said license or any renewal thereof, and upon the said licensee failing to observe, comply with or perform any of such restrictions, conditions or regulations, the license granted to such vendor of milk shall forthwith become null and void.

7. Every licensed vendor of milk offering milk for sale in the City of Fredericton shall at least once a year, deliver to the Board of Health a statement containing (1) His name and address; (2) The source or sources of his milk supply; (3) The number of cows in his possession; (4) The average quantity of milk disposed of either (a) to milk shops, (b) to milk vendors, (c) or to private consumers; (5) The situation of his dairy or dairies, and such other information as the Board or its officers may deem necessary.

8. Every licensed vendor of milk shall comply with the various clauses of the Public Health Act by giving notice to the local Board of any cases of contagious disease in his family or in his farm house or shop at which, from which, or in which the milk is either sent or received, and he shall further carry out the restrictions laid upon him by the local Board under the Public Health Act.

9. No licensed milk vendor shall sell or offer for sale in the city of Fredericton any milk which is unwholesome or unfit for human food, or any milk which has been adulterated, or has been reduced or changed by the addition of water or other substance, or by the removal of cream, or milk known as swill milk, or milk from cows or other animals fed upon garbage or the like substance, or milk from diseased animals; but skimmed milk may be sold as such if contained in cans or vessels bearing upon their exterior the word "Skimmed" placed conspicuously in letters not less than two inches in length; and no person shall supply such skimmed milk unless such quality of milk is asked for by purchaser.

10. Every licensed milk vendor shall permit all his milk cows and cow byres, and all dairies and other places in which milk is sold or kept, to be inspected by the Health Officers, or person or persons appointed for that purpose by the Board of Health whenever any such officers may desire to do so, and no licensed vendor of milk shall keep any milk intended for sale, or which may be afterwards sold or offered for sale in the said city, in any place where such milk is likely to become unwholesome or liable to produce disease, either by reason of adulteration, contamination with sewerage, absorption of disease germs infection of cows, uncleanness, or any other unrecognized cause, nor

in any place condemned by the Board or its authorized official, nor carry it in any wagon of vehicle used for the conveyance of swill, manure, or any other offensive material.

11. Every licensed vendor of milk shall have the number of his license conspicuously placed on the wagon or vehicle from which the milk is sold, and every can or vessel from which it is sold when no vehicle is used.

12. Every dairyman and vendor of milk and every driver of milk wagons or vehicles having in his possession in the city of Fredericton milk for sale in the said city at the time, shall, whenever so requested, furnish the Inspector of the Board with such samples of milk as he may require from time to time and at such places as the samples may be demanded.

13. Every sample of milk shall have a label attached to the vessel containing it, which shall have written thereon at the time of collecting it, the number of sample, date of collection and the initials of the officer or inspector receiving the same, who shall at once enter in a book (carried for that purpose) for further reference, a corresponding number with the name of the owner or driver from whom the said sample was obtained.

14. Each sample shall be examined separately according to its number, by the medical health officer or person appointed for the purpose, who shall register the specific gravity, temperature and percentage of butter fat, opposite a corresponding number in a book kept for that purpose, the names of the owners to be subsequently inserted.

15. The Health Officers and Sanitary Inspectors are authorized and required to inspect, as often as to them or any of them seem necessary, all Milk offered for sale whether on any of the streets, public places or shops of the said City, and to seize and destroy all such Milk which may, on such inspection, be found unwholesome or unfit for human food.

16. Any one infringing any of the above regulations will be subject, for every offence to a penalty not exceeding Forty Dollars.

17. These regulations will come in force on the first day of June, 1912.

## THE CATHEDRAL CHIMES, APPEAL TO THE PUBLIC

The Deanery, Fredericton, N. B.  
To the Editor of The Mail,

Dear Mr. Editor:—May I ask the Press of Fredericton to (fulfill a promise at the time of the Cathedral fire last year and assist me to bring the matter of the bells and clock for our restored Cathedral before the public of our City.

The Cathedral authorities have not moved in the matter heretofore, for two reasons: In the first place, we of course, had great hopes that we should win out against the Insurance Companies in our case regarding the bells, and in the second place, it was very uncertain whether or not the General Insurance allowance would more than meet the calls upon it.

That we lost our case in the courts has been public property for some time. We are also in a position now to state the entire insurance will be used up in the restoration of the Cathedral and the furnishing of the building, so that so far as the authorities are concerned we can see nothing for it, but to reopen the Cathedral without the clock and chimes.

We shall of course, at once inaugurate a fund, of which we have already secured a nucleus, which shall have for its object the providing of the bells, but, as the estimates for the new bells secured from the makers of the original in England, amounts to between eight and nine thousand (\$9,000,000) dollars, it will clearly mean, that, unless some special effort is undertaken there will be no chimes or clock for some years to come.

The authorities appreciate the fact that the people of Fredericton generally take an interest and pride in the Cathedral property, for every one realizes I think that in the large number of visitors attracted to our City each year because they have heard of the beauty of "The English Cathedral," the property is a direct asset.

It is also well known, that the citizens of the greater portion of the City, have relied upon the Cathedral clock as the public time piece which could be depended upon; while the daily ringing of the chimes has delighted the ears of all.

These facts have been often impressed upon the members of the Cathedral congregation by their fellow citizens during the past nine (9) months, and since in these days people are usually ready when accepting privileges of this nature to assume some responsibility, one is not surprised to learn, that a number of persons have expressed again and again, a willingness to join in any undertaking to replace the bells. While Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Whitehead have generously led the way, by a promised subscription of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars.

Realizing, therefore, that it is not a purely personal matter to them-

ves, the Cathedral authorities would ask you to make the situation regarding the clock and chimes, known to the people of the city.

The condition of affairs amount to this: Left to themselves the authorities will work away upon a fund for the bells and are determined to replace both the clock and chimes, even though it may take them many years to accomplish it, but if the citizens generally would like to assist in the undertaking, the Cathedral authorities would gladly welcome such assistance and be prepared to push the undertaking so much more vigorously.

I shall be grateful if you will kindly publish this letter in two or three issues of your paper, directing the attention of your readers to it, and if you are willing, I should also esteem it a favor, if you would allow subscriptions to be received at your office, acknowledging the same in the columns of your paper.

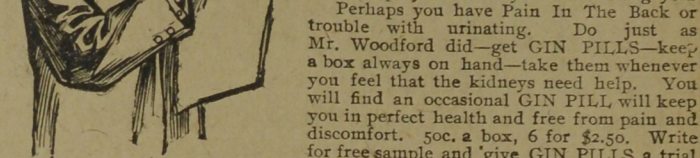

## ST. JOHN LONGSHOREMEN MADE A TURMOIL

Montreal, May 16—A body of St. John, N.B., longshoremen stirred up turmoil in local labor ranks yesterday and a free fight nearly ensued on the water front. The easterners had come to Montreal to work. There is a tax of \$7 or \$8 per head on Montreal men going to St. John to work and thus there was some ill-feeling on the part of several of the Montreal longshoremen when they found St. John men coming to work here unimpeded by any restriction. The difficulty was finally settled however, by the St. John men leaving the gang with whom they had been working and finding employment with non-union workers. This they had no difficulty in doing as there is a scarcity of labor in the port at present.

## AUSTRIAN PREMIER LOSES EYESIGHT

Vienna, May 16—The Austrian premier, Count Stuergh, was suddenly stricken with blindness yesterday. The attending physicians say that he is suffering from a disease of the retina and they fear that he may not recover his sight.

Montclair, N.C., May 17—A large and representative attendance marked the opening here today of the annual convention of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs. The program for the gathering extends over two days and provides for papers, addresses and discussions dealing with a wide variety of subjects. The local club women have prepared elaborate entertainment for the visitors.
