# HOW THE TORY PRESS IS BEING LOADED UP

(Toronto Globe)

From the office of the Chief Government Whip at Ottawa, upon letter-paper bearing the Royal arms, and marked "personal and important," there was addressed on October 5 a circular letter to Conservative editors. It is well that the country should know how political "news" is obtained nowadays. The letter says: "Attached herewith you will find several galleys of news matter of a political character. This is the beginning of free service for the purpose of giving wider publicity to authentic Government news and other political information of a timely character. Your paper has been recommended to be placed on the list in the belief that you will be willing to make use of the service. This service will be weekly and sent without cost to the papers receiving it. All that is required in return is that a copy of your paper be sent to the undersigned in order that a check may be kept of the matter published."

"You will notice the articles are varied in character and tone so as to suit particular requirements. I would be pleased to hear from you as to the quality of the matter which would suit you best in order that I may know what to send you from week to week if you take advantage of the service."

"This service will not be furnished the large city papers, and overlapping will be avoided as far as possible if you will let me know what other papers have a circulation in your territory."

"The news matter will be absolutely authentic, and the requirements of particular localities will be considered. You may use the matter dated from here as a 'special' or as editorial comment, just as you choose."

"The news matter will be up-to-date, and written by a staff thoroughly in touch with their subjects."

"Kindly lead me from you by return mail as to the amount you can make use of and the particular kind of matter you require."

"I ask you to consider this letter confidential."

Among the things that were sent out on this first week's service were

statements that in connection with the Hudson Bay Railway the Hon. Frank Cochrane "in one short year has accomplished more than the Liberals did in fifteen years of power;" that the Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Customs, "with vision of foresight, suited his way to an expanding country;" that "British citizenship is not a necessary qualification in voting for Scott Government candidates;" that "Hon. Sydney Fisher has been earning the applause of Ontario audiences by that part of his lengthy oration which runs, 'ladies and gentlemen, I shall not detain you further,'" and that "Sir Wilfrid Laurier's entourage there are discovered five ex-members of the Cabinet who seem to stick closer than a brother to the leader himself. Caesar had once very dear friends, but personal ambitions under the guise of patriotism brought forth a Unitus and a Cassius."

The Globe would like to enter a protest on behalf of the Conservative Press against the slack proof-reading of the service. It is greatly to be feared that many a hurried and worried editor will not recognize in Unitus our old and esteemed friend Brutus, and that thus grave wrong will be done to "the noblest Roman of them all."

There is a serious side to all this. It is hardly to be expected that this Government Press Bureau shall have the field to itself. The Liberal organization must oppose Press Bureau to Press Bureau as it opposes platform campaign to platform campaign. Ready-made "news" is perhaps not a bad thing for papers that cannot maintain correspondents at the Capital. But ready-made "views," whether Liberal or Conservative, are not good for the press, or for the people who obtain their impressions of public affairs from the Press. From ready-made views to political opinions, for the insertion of which advertising rates are secretly paid, is but a short step, and it was undoubtedly taken by a considerable number of Canadian papers in the campaign of September, 1911. Is loading up the Press with views as well as news to become a recognized part of the business of political organizations in Canada? That will not be a good thing for Canada.

## IMPORTANT TESTIMONY AT BECKER'S TRIAL

New York, Oct. 15—Dapper little Sam Scheppe, gambler and underworld hangeron, whom District Attorney Whitman's men seized at Hot Springs, Ark., took the witness stand this morning at the trial of Police Lt. Chas. Becker, Rose, Vallon, and Webber having given their coincidence versions of the alleged plot to slay Herman Rosenthal. The prosecutor hoped to find further corroboration in the story of Scheppe. The little gambler has described himself the "Keystone" of the arch. Scheppe told of knowing Jack Ross and former Lt. Becker and of carrying messages between the two. He said he was present at the meeting at Dora Gilbert's house when Rosenthal's former wife made the affidavit "blackening the gambler's character," on the night before the murder. Scheppe also told of getting into the murder car at Fourteenth Street with Ross and Vallon, of picking up "Dago Frank" and thence driving to Webber's poker room; "Whitey Louis," "Lefty Louis" and "Gyp the Blood" were waiting in the street. All went up into the poker room, Scheppe said and sat down at a table, "Bridge" Webber, he continued went out and returned with the message that Rosenthal was at the Metropole.

"What happened then?" asked Assistant District Attorney Moss. "Lefty, Gyp, Lewis and Dago Frank went out."

Scheppe said that he went out later and traced for Mr. Moss his movements on Broadway and other streets. He said about 1:30 o'clock that morning about half an hour before the murder, he saw Becker driving in an automobile on Forty Second St. After the murder he met Vallon at the Elks Club. Thence he went to his apartments on Fourteenth St. and then to the apartment of the Gunmen.

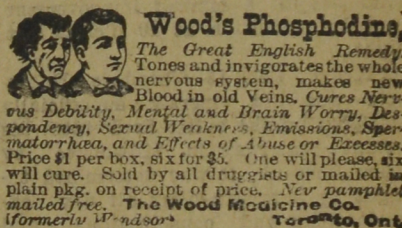

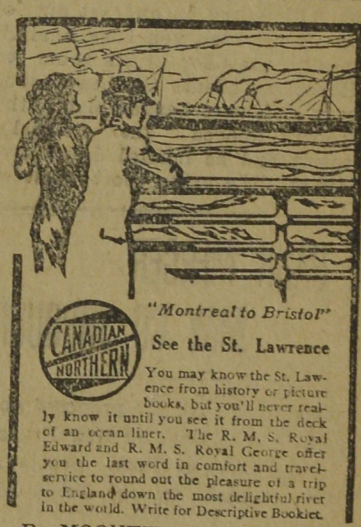
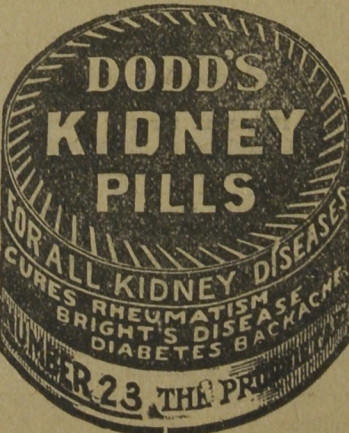

## Miss MORGAN, York St.

TO TRY WOMAN FOR 7-YEAR-OLD MURDER

Augusta, Me., Oct. 15—Mrs. Elsie Hobbs Raymond of Poland who has been confined in jail here since she was indicted for murder last April will probably be tried at the Kennebec county court that convened today. The case is one of the most notable in the criminal annals of Maine. Mrs. Raymond is accused of the murder of Mattie Hackett, a young girl of Readfield, who was called from her home by an unknown person on the evening of August 17, 1905 and strangled to death in a thicket nearby. Suspicion soon fell upon Mrs. Raymond on an acquaintance of the murdered girl, who was believed to have been jealous of her. Mrs. Raymond and her husband gave an account of their movements on the evening of the crime which established an alibi, that the State could not find evidence enough at the time to destroy. Last spring, however the prosecuting attorney presented newly discovered evidence to the grand jury with the result that Mrs. Raymond was indicted on a charge of murder in the first degree.
