CRAZY MAN'S TALK.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 16.—The police last night completed the work of transcribing the confession of John Schrank, given to Chief of Police Jannsen. It is, in part, as follows: "What object did you have in following around and trying to kill Theodore Roosevelt?"

"Well, because I have been reading his story and following up history and I have seen that this man Roosevelt is trying to break one of the old traditions of the country, calling it a third term, which he had no right to. He can create a third party and create all the officers but to nominate himself and I think that it is absolutely necessary to establish and have the third term tradition to exist and not be violated by anybody."

"Why did you want to meet him?" "Because I wanted to put him out of the way. A man that wants a third term has no right to live."

"Have you any other reason in wanting to kill him?"

"I have."

"What is that?"

Following is the statement issued by the physicians this morning:

"The records show that Col. Roosevelt passed a very good night. His temperature and pulse are normal. Temperature 98.8. His pulse at six o'clock this morning was 74 and his temperature was 96.6 and respiration 20. He is having less irritation of his pleura from the injured rib than he did yesterday. "business transactions" and that she had learned their nature from Becker at her home. This was the middle of last April, she added, when Becker had caused a raid to be made on her husband's gambling place. Becker was in the house at the time, she said.

"I heard a hammering on the door and went down to let them in, before they broke the door in. I couldn't find the key and went up stairs to see Becker. I said to Becker, 'for heavens sake what does this mean?' Mr. Becker said it was to be Herman or me. Then I went down stairs with him and said, 'don't let them break down the house. Don't let them destroy my furniture.' He said, 'Tell Herman that debt is off. I'll go down and tell that man to call it off as Herman and I are square and he doesn't owe me that \$1,500.' I said 'What man?' He said, 'Never mind what man; Herman knows.'"

Mrs. Rosenthal's verdict was almost toneless. She appeared to be very nervous and she occasionally faltered when she attempted a long sentence. She told of having seen her husband pass money to Jack Rose, Becker's alleged collector and said that Rosenthal had left behind him scarcely enough to bury him.

The witness was then turned over to the defence for cross examination. "Did you continue to have any ill feeling toward Becker after the raid?" asked Attorney McIntyre.

"I did not feel very good towards him."

Throughout the examination Mr. McIntyre had asked his questions in a low tone of voice, addressing the witness as "madam" and framing his questions apparently with great care.

TURKEY WANTS APOLOGY FROM BALKAN STATES

The government announce that it will release the seized Greek vessels which have foreign-owned cargoes on board.

New York, Oct. 15.—A London cable this morning says:

With the signature of peace with Italy, the Turkish fleet is released and becomes no insignificant factor in the Balkan war now beginning.

There has still been no declaration of war but Turkey has recalled her ministers from Greece and the Balkan States and the allied kings are expected to declare that hostilities have been begun by royal proclamation today.

News from the theatre of war is still withheld for the correspondents have not yet been allowed to proceed to the front but the Bulgarian army is believed to be ready to strike Adrianople, while the Serbian army is divided into three forces.

One will march on Uskub, Macedonia, by the Morava Valley. The second after getting in touch with the Bulgarian forces in the neighborhood of Kistendil, will move on Uskub from the east through the Eari Palanah Pass and Kumanova. The third will, it is reported, unite with the Montenegrin forces in the Albanian Alps and the Novipazar district.

The main Bulgarian army, massed on the Upper Maritza River, with the object of invading Thrace, numbers a quarter of a million men.

Berlin, Oct. 16.—A limit of twenty-four hours has been fixed by Turkey for the Balkan States and Greece to apologize for the sending of their insolent note to the Porte, according to a special despatch from Constantinople.

Constantinople, Oct. 16.—By wireless telegraph to Kustendje, Rumania, the conclusion of peace between Italy and Turkey was fully anticipated by the Ottoman government, although the news did not reach here until four o'clock this morning and is still unknown to citizens generally. In the meantime, the ministry of marine was taking active steps to prepare the Turkish fleet to take part in the campaign. Italian squadrons have now been stationed at the mouth of the Black Sea in order to escort any army of invasion to the Bulgarian military commanders to divert part of their army from the main attack on Turkey in Macedonia.

Notwithstanding the most elaborate precautions taken by the Turkish troops, Bulgarian bands have succeeded in destroying some important bridges near Istip and Kotzichana so that communication with Scutari is completely interrupted and the news from the Montenegro frontier is very meagre.

The Ottoman government has solved the problem of the employment of Christian soldiers in the Turkish army by using them in the garrison of Asia Minor and also partly in Constantinople.

Ouchy, Switzerland, Oct. 16.—The peace treaty between Italy and Turkey provides that the Sultan shall issue a decree proclaiming the autonomy of the Tripolitan province of Libya and that after this has been done the Italian government shall issue a decree establishing in Libya a system of government based on Italian sovereignty.

The Turkish government is to grant an amnesty to the populations of the islands in the Aegean Sea, who revolted during the war against Turkish rule.
