NEWS FOR SUBSCRIBERS

According to the postal law now in force, newspaper publishers can hold for fraud anyone who takes a paper from the post office and refuses payment and the man who allows subscriptions to remain unpaid and then orders a postmaster to send notification of discontinuance to the publishers lays himself liable to arrest andfine. Postmasters are liable under the law for, the cost of papers delivered to other persons after the death or removal from their district of the person to whom the paper was first addressed.
