STRAY TOPICS FROM LITTLE OLD NEW YORK

New York, Oct. 9.—When that old saying about everything being fair in love or war originated press agents were an unknown quantity. Had they been known then the saying would surely have included "and theatrical advertising." Oscar Hammerstein has the reputation of holding rather liberal views upon the subject of the fairness of theatrical advertising, but he has evidently come to the conclusion that the line must be drawn somewhere. He had no objections to the various yarns which the press agent of Miss Felice Lyne, the new prima donna discovered by him, saw fit to circulate to arouse public interest in the singer, so long as they were kept within reasonable bounds, but when the young prima donna entertained the reporters upon her arrival in this country with a sensational story as to how Mr. Hammerstein had "grossly insulted" her and how she had slapped him, he considered this a step beyond the bounds of advertising ethics and promptly filed a libel suit for \$100,000 against Miss Felice Lyne. No matter what the outcome of the libel suit may be the end sought by the singer—extensive advertising—has already been accomplished. His friends are quietly speculating what Mr. Hammerstein is going to do with the \$100,000—when he gets it.

The Pulitzer School of Journalism at Columbia University has been formally opened and the attendance is already larger than was anticipated. The students come from all parts of the United States and many of them have had from one to four years practical experience on various newspapers. There is no record that the students have elected the color for their school banner or their college yell. It is sincerely hoped by the friends of the institution that the color to be selected will not be yellow.

The present political campaign is not without its interesting and even sensational features and, moreover, these features are by no means always supplied by the candidates on the national ticket. The Democratic campaign managers went a long way toward sensationalism by establishing a Chamber of Horrors exhibition with a view of giving an abject lesson in political economy. In the "Chamber of Women" they exhibited dressed dummies with every piece of their wearing apparel labeled to show the tariff upon the goods and their cost as an argument for a down-revision of the tariff. To answer this implied argument the Woman's Department of the National Republican Committee has decided to form a silk-stocking club, all its members to wear silk hosiery. This is intended to show as a Republican argument that nowhere else in the world would it be possible for women in moderate circumstances to do this. The club will be started in a few days with an exhibition of silk hosiery in the Woman's Department, and it is promised that there will be more colors, more varieties and sizes and a greater variety of prices than any one woman has ever seen before. All women who wish to join the Republican Silk Stocking Club and wear sheer silk hosiery as a mark of good Republicanism, can do so by sending their names to the Woman's Department of the National Republican Committee in this city. As the silk stocking argument would fall flat unless freely brought to the attention of the public, it is predicted that short dresses will become extremely popular among the members of the Silk Stocking Club and liberal displays of silk hosiery a matter of everyday occurrence. No protest has been heard so far from the male element of any of the parties.

More than eight hundred boys attending Public School No. 19, in Fourteenth Street, near First Avenue went on a strike the other day when they learned that their beloved principal, James B. T. Demarest, was to be transferred to a school in Harlem. Mr. Demarest was extremely popular with the boys in his school because he took a great personal interest in interscholastic athletics and encouraged athletic sports among the boys of his school to such good purpose that school No. 19 could boast of some of the strongest athletic teams among the schools of the city. Louis Getiner, the captain of the basketball team, who has evidently been a careful reader of labor news, organized the strike and by a clever ruse even induced the boys of another school in the neighborhood to go on a sympathetic strike. "Only by the

most determined efforts of Mr. Demarest, whose transfer means for him a promotion, could the boys be induced to return to school and to call the strike off.

John McKeon of this city, and his only sister had a re-union the other day at Schenectady, for the first time in fifty-two years. John was seven years old and his sister thirteen when she ran away from home because her mother had spanked her. The girl found work as a servant in a household where she remained until she married. She never made an attempt to communicate with her parents died some years ago in the belief that she was dead. A short time ago she ran across the trail of her brother and after an exchange of letters a meeting was arranged at Schenectady. McKeon immediately recognized his sister owing to her strong resemblance to their deceased mother.

Among the guests at the Waldorf-Astoria last week was a man, apparently in opulent circumstances, who, not so many years ago, had been one of the bellboys in that great hostelry. Early reminiscences die hard as the saying is. While enjoying his after-dinner siesta in the smoking room the former bellhop would jump up whenever he heard the bell and it was this automatic response to a well known signal which finally induced the man to tell the story of his life. He admitted that he had been once a bellhop in the Waldorf-Astoria, but was now rich enough to stop at the hotel and to give \$1 tips to the present day bellhops. He said that he had made a fortune in promoting mining schemes in Canada.

There is a shipyard in Raritan Bay on the Jersey Coast, near Sandy Hook, which is owned and conducted by a woman, Mrs. Edith De Witt Vreeland. When her husband, the owner of the shipyard, died about a year ago and left the property to her, she decided to continue the business. She worked and studied hard to learn all the details of the business but the shipowners had a prejudice against women's work in the shipbuilding and repairing line. By her perseverance, however, she finally convinced a few of them of her ability to turn out good work and now her business is flourishing.

ARCHAEOLOGISTS MEET IN ROME

Rome, Oct. 9.—With an attendance of nearly 500 of the most prominent archaeologists and historians from all parts of the world, the third international congress of Archaeology assembled in Rome today for a session of five days. The United States is represented by the congress by a large and distinguished delegation, the members of which include Prof. George M. Wheeler of the Archaeological Institute of America, Prof. Arthur Frothingham of Princeton University, Prof. Joseph Clark Hoppin of Providence, Dr. Ivan M. Linforth of the University of California, Prof. Charles S. Goodwin of Lehigh University, and Dr. Charles Peabody of Harvard University.

The session of the congress today was held in the historic castle of San Angelo. The subjects to be dealt with during the five days of the congress comprise prehistoric, Oriental, pre-Hellenic, Italian and Etruscan archaeology, the history of classic art, Greek and Roman antiquities, epigraphy, numismatics, mythology, history of religions, ancient topography and Christian archaeology.

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN

Washington, D.C., Oct. 9.—There is to be a total eclipse of the sun tomorrow, but few persons in the United States and none in Canada will have an opportunity to view the phenomena. Residents of Southern Florida, if conditions are favorable, will be treated to a partial performance by old Sol when he hides himself behind the moon.

The path of totality will cross South America from a point near Quito, Ecuador, to Rio Janeiro, Brazil. The best place, it is figured, for observing the eclipse will be in the vicinity of the Brazilian metropolis. Here the astronomers from America and Europe have set up instruments with long, unpronounceable names to take observations during the ten minutes' duration of the total phase.

A total eclipse is of popular interest because as a mere spectacle it is one of the most beautiful presented to human eyes. But the problems uppermost in the minds of the scientists in connection with solar eclipses are those relating to the sun's corona, which can be seen only when the sun is hidden by the moon. It is an appendage to the sun, consisting of very tenuous gases chiefly, and apparently kept out in its position by a repellent power of the sun.

IMPERIAL TRADE CONFERENCE

London, Oct. 9.—The Imperial Trade Commission, which has now practically assumed the functions of a grand council of the British Empire for the adjustment and improvement of trade conditions, resumed its sittings today. The present inquiry is to be conducted with especial reference to the commercial relations of the Mother Country and other portions of the empire with Canada, which is represented at the conference by Hon. George E. Foster, minister of trade and commerce in the Borden cabinet. The inquiry is to embrace a general investigation into trade conditions, a survey of the natural resources of the Dominion, their families for production, manufactures and sources of supply and a discussion of ways and means for improving the present system of promoting immigration.

MONTREAL GREEKS ARE ENTHUSIASTIC

Montreal, Oct. 9.—At a wildly enthusiastic meeting which lasted all night the local Greek colony subscribed nearly twenty thousand dollars to send to the Home Land, as many young Greeks who will volunteer and reservists of the regular army are living in Montreal. One merchant contributed five thousand dollars and the Greek church rang with cheers as one merchant after another contributed sums ranging from a thousand dollars up, to the fund. Not only Greeks but a score of young Canadians volunteered at the Greek consulate this morning for army service. Four hundred Greeks from Toronto went through this morning being joined by the local volunteers and will sail from New York. The steamer on which they will depart for the war is being kept a close secret.

FOR LOWER EXPRESS RATES

Washington, D. C., Oct. 9.—This was the date tentatively fixed by the Interstate Commerce Commission for the express companies to show cause why the new rates fixed by the commission should not be adopted by them. But as the new parcel post system has raised some complications in the adjustment of the express rates which the commission as well as the express companies believes will take some time to straighten out, it is regarded as likely that the hearings on the new rates will go over until December.

MEETING OF TEXAS PHOTOGRAPHER

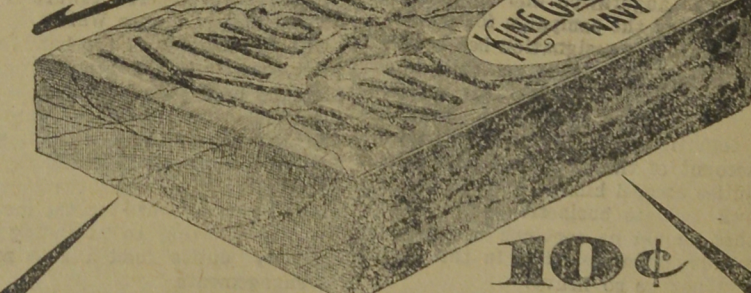
