

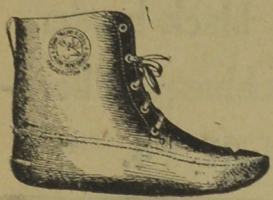

ence that they had not considered the question!

NEED MORE ABLE AND ACTIVE MEN

"But that is not sufficient. I say that if the Government of Canada are not prepared in six weeks time to consider any important question submitted to them it is time you should have more able, courageous and active men to conduct your affairs. (Loud Applause.)

"And why did they delay so long in considering this matter? The answer is obvious. They were too busy trying to reconcile differences and make up their minds to have a naval policy! That is what has absorbed all their attention for the past month, and still they cannot agree upon any permanent policy, although when they came into office they protested their eagerness for a 'speedy' construction of a Canadian navy.

"Mr. Borden was very 'speedy' in Opposition, but he has been very slow in office." (Applause.)

UNHOLY ALLIANCE DENOUNCED.

Sir Wilfrid then proceeded to discuss the delay in the formulation of a naval policy by the Borden Government in trenchant terms, denouncing the unholy alliance between the Nationalists and Conservatives which had led to the present impasse with one section of the Cabinet determined that there should be no navy and no contribution while the other wing was equally determined that there should be both.

"It is this coalition between the English Jingoists and the French Nationalists which is responsible for the failure of the Government to do anything on the naval question," declared Sir Wilfrid "because it is impossible for such opposing elements to agree (Applause)

"But I wish one word on this matter. We Liberals view it above racial differences. Whatever may be our origin or our creed there is only one thing for us to consider, and that is we must view this question solely in the light of our rights as Canadians and our duty as British subjects. (Loud cheers)

A TENSE AND SOLEMN MOMENT.

"Heaven is my witness," concluded Sir Wilfrid in an outburst of earnest expression, which was greeted with tense feeling by the immense crowd, "Heaven is my witness that what I have done I did because it was for the good of Canada, and my duty as a Canadian and British subject and I would do it again. (Cheers)

"We went courageously and fairly to do our duty in these matters. Now that the Canadian people have seen the failure of their present government to deal with these questions after a whole year, they have the remedy in their own hands and I know they will apply it at the proper time. (Loud applause)

CANNOT FOOL MAJORITY AGAIN

"Last time most of the people were fooled. Some will continue to be fooled next time, but the majority will not be fooled. For my part, I remain with the conviction that the cause we fought for was

The conclusion of Sir Wilfrid's address was again the occasion for a wonderful demonstration, the whole audience rising and waving hats and handkerchiefs as they applauded, while it took a final three cheers before their surcharged emotions were sufficiently quieted to allow the meeting to go on.

YACHT BELIEVED TO HAVE FOUNDERED

Rimouski, Que., Oct. 9--Careful search up to noon today had failed to fathom the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the yacht Bernadette, which, with a party of men, has been missing since Saturday night. The steamer Lady Evelyn of the post office department, after a twenty-four hours' search, reported at noon today that no trace of the missing yacht could be found. The Bernadette was commanded by Harold Blair, its proprietor, one of the managers of the Price Brothers' firm at Rimouski, and should have reached port Monday morning.

The Bernadette left for the North Shore in a friendly race with the yacht Oenone, commanded by Mr. A. Fournier, of Rimouski, its proprietor. The Oenone arrived in port early Monday morning and reports a very rough passage across. The Bernadette left at the same time. Friends of the missing men have communicated with all signal service stations, but nothing has been seen of the yacht. The missing men are Harold Blair, E. Tessier, son of Judge Tessier; F. X. Proulx, secretary of the town; A. Ringuet, merchant; Beckingsale and Bonner, clerks in the Bank of Commerce, and Geo. McKinnon, clerk in Price Brothers' office. Everything points to the Bernadette having foundered while crossing the St. Lawrence.

NEW YORK'S BIG ELECTRIC SHOW

New York, Oct. 9--The myriad wonders of electricity were never better illustrated than in the countless exhibits at the Electrical Show, which opened today in Grand Central Palace. Foremost among the exhibits is that of the federal government. This includes a miniature reproduction of the Gatun section of the Panama Canal, showing how the great locks will be operated by electricity when completed. Another government exhibit is the pulmotor, an electrical device adopted by the Bureau of Mines for resuscitating miners overcome by suffocation.

TO DISCUSS DRY FARMING

Lethbridge, Alta., Oct. 10--One week hence an army of several thousand men, banded together by their common interest in the science of raising grain and vegetables with little rainfall, will be moving on Lethbridge to attend the Seventh International Dry Farming Congress. The committee in charge of the local arrangements is in receipt of advices which indicate the largest and most representative attendance in the history of the congress. Thirty countries are to send representatives. In connection with the gathering there will be an elaborate exhibition of dry-farm products from various parts of the United States and Canada, to show what can be accomplished under seemingly adverse conditions. Another feature will be a display of over \$50,000 worth of machinery adapted to dry farming work.

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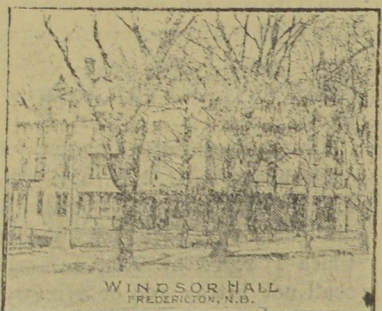
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
