TORY TACTICS IN MacDONALD, MAN

Winnipeg, Oct. 7.—On Saturday Sir Rodmond Roblin publicly threatened to arrest certain gentlemen from Saskatchewan, who are here speaking and working throughout the riding for R. L. Richardson and the cause of reciprocity, and who have been generally referred to by the Manitoba Premier as a "boodling and bribing brigade of political thugs, who appear to have been making their home in Saskatchewan." Sir Rodmond made his threat as follows:—"I have instructed the Provincial Police to arrest these men, and they will be placed in jail at the earliest possible moment when they attempt to do the work they have been sent here to do, and I want to say that because a man is an M. P. P. or an ex-M. P. P. in Saskatchewan or anywhere else it will not prevent justice being done. The public may expect rapid and startling developments unless this band of political brigands is recalled at once."

MR. SULLIVAN PUT BEHIND BARS

Following this threat on Saturday, Mr. Roblin put his machinery in operation very quickly. This afternoon at Carman Mr. J. J. Sullivan of Melville, Saskatchewan was arrested two hours after he had stepped off the train which had taken him from Winnipeg to Carman. Mr. Sullivan was brought back to Winnipeg by one of the Provincial Police, and is spending tonight behind the bars of the Provincial jail. Up till a late hour tonight Mr. Sullivan's friends were unable to arrange for his bail or temporary release, although ample surety was offered. Feeling at Mr. Richardson's headquarters is exceedingly wrought up over the arrest of Mr. Sullivan, against whom absolutely no evidence was produced.

Hon. J. A. Calder, acting Premier of Saskatchewan, who arrived in Winnipeg today from Regina, characterizes the arrest of Mr. Sullivan as one of the most dastardly attempts in the history of Canadian politics to stifle free speech and discussion. Mr. Calder referring to Sir Rodmond Roblin's charge against Saskatchewan said to your correspondent tonight: "You may say for me that the references to the part being played in the Macdonald election by a few of our prominent citizens and public men are not only unwarranted, but absolutely false."

OTHERS TO CAST INTO JAIL

"As for the threats made to rid the constituency of the band of brigands by rapid and startling developments" concluded Mr. Calder, "I suppose the Premier of Manitoba proposes to throttle free speech by casting into jail Hon. Thos. MacNutt, M.P., W. E. Knowles, M.P., Wm. Martin, M.P. Dr. Clark, M.P., Hon. Frank Oliver, J. Haslam, Hon. Geo. Langley, and a few other citizens of the west who have volunteered their services in the discussion of the great issue now before the electors of Macdonald."

LIBERALS AND INDEPENDENTS ALERT

With only five days remaining until the final vote is taken and with the rural parts of the constituency remaining firm for reciprocity, the Liberal and Independent workers are preparing themselves to meet any sort of treachery at the hands of their opponents. Tonight the following telegram was sent to the various districts from Mr. Richardson's headquarters:

"We have been advised that attempts are to be made by Roblin-Rogers machine to bribe or intimidate Liberal scrutineers. Advise all friends and report immediately any such attempts. Central Executive is determined to have clean election. Suggests appointment of Local Vigilance Committee to guide against corruption."

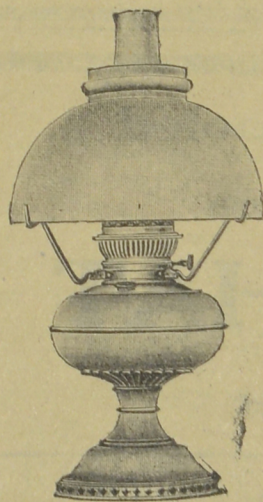
