## BACCALAUREATE SERMON WAS HEARD BY MANY

ETERNAL RIGHTEOUSNESS

territory, increase of population, ex-  
penditure on educational or religious  
institutions; not in any of these  
things, useful and essential though  
they be, shall the strength and great-  
ness of a nation be found. Great  
ideas and great men make a nation  
great—great ideas embodied and find-  
ing utterances in great men. The  
ages and the races blossom and reach  
perfection in one out-standing man.  
For in the crisis struggle of a na-  
tion, in the hour of a people's des-  
tiny, the soul of the crowd goes into  
the blood of one of her sons on whom  
the birth-right falls. A son of the  
people, consecrated and set apart as  
counsellor and guide of his genera-  
tion because he is true to his ideals—  
obedient to the heavenly vision. So  
may there come to each of you the  
holy vision splendid and the holy  
and resolute purpose to make the  
vision of Canadian citizenship real.  
To you young men and maidens  
comes this call to give yourselves  
with intelligence and consecration to  
beneficial public service. It may be  
in the open where the white light  
makes your innermost secrets plain  
and where the stones of criticism lie  
thick about you. Or it may be in  
the way less full of storm and stress.  
It matters little, if, so be, in the  
place that God assigns you, you  
are true to yourself, to the great  
purpose of life and the future of  
your country. A great writer said  
that patriotism is to a nation the  
love of life is to an individual. Suf-  
fer this word of exhortation: Be loy-  
al to the Crown, be obedient to its  
laws, be intelligent patriotic—and to  
the critics of your life and your opin-  
ion, who under-estimate your ability  
and question your loyal attachment  
to the King and to the Empire be it  
yours to say:

"While the Jack is waving and the  
whole broad land replies,  
In the red and white of orchards, in  
our blue Canadian skies,  
If any man call us traitor, by the  
God in heaven he lies."

### A GREAT TASK

You come to your place and work  
in the dawn of a day fragrant with  
opportunity. It is yours to engage  
in business and prove that it is not  
selfishness and greed but brotherhood,  
to practise politics until it shall be  
seen that its deepest meaning is the  
well-being and uplift of the last and  
lowest man. A great task and a  
great risk you say. Verily, but what  
is young life for—but to brave dan-  
gers and take risks. What is salt  
for? To be put in contact with that  
which is in danger of decay. What  
is light for? To shine in darkness  
that the darkness may be dissipated.  
What is Christianity in the young  
heart for? To capture world move-  
ments for Christ and to lift the race  
to the level of the Divine thought and  
purpose and bind them as with chains  
of gold around the feet of God. To  
this holy service you are called. See  
to it that you discharge your obliga-  
tion with the honesty, with the hon-  
or, with the integrity, with the con-  
secration we have a right to expect  
from men and women of your train-  
ing, of your faith and of your blood.  
So that you and I, and all faithful  
workers may come without fear to  
the Gates of the City to be judged,  
and join hands with those who have  
gone before us and those who shall  
come after us, with the toilers and  
the builders out of the East Land  
and the West Land and the North  
Land and the South Land, in build-  
ing this Canadian commonwealth in  
which a larger freedom shall come to  
opinion and a wider sweep shall come  
to life.

"Then afterward cometh the great  
Lord God, the Master of every  
trade,  
And tellest the tale of the Seventh  
Day of the Edens newly made,  
And we rise to our feet as he passes  
by, gentlemen, not afraid."

To cherish these visions, to follow  
these inherent and constructive in-  
tuitions of the soul, and properly to  
estimate life's values, you need the  
strengthening Vision of Eternal Right  
eousness. To define duty may be dif-  
cult, and yet in all lands men have  
recognized that they ought to do  
something. There has been a differ-  
ence of opinion as to what was com-  
manded; a difference in the ethical  
standards of the nations—and also  
in the standard of each nation at dif-  
ferent times in its history. All teach-  
ers and all people recognize that they  
ought to do what seems to them to  
be right. This "ought" is universal-  
ly imperative, Righteousness is obedi-  
ence to this imperious "ought." The  
future of the nation, of the church,  
is with the young hearts who with  
the blessing Alma Mater are going  
out into the wide, wide world. The  
devastation of the years will soon  
leave you in the fore-front of the  
battle. It will be yours to face the  
awful diapason of the guns,  
to seize the banners, as they  
fall from our nerveless grasp,  
and bear them on into the illimitable  
tomorrow. And what sort of a to-  
morrow will you give the world? If  
you are to be the builders and help-  
ers of the future you must ground  
yourselves in the faith that God is  
righteous and that the only great-  
ness of a man or a nation is right-  
eousness. There will be no fibre in  
your morality, no continuity in your  
reforms, no permanence in your  
movements, unless you have the  
strength that the solemn awe-inspir-  
ing vision of righteousness alone can  
give. Go out, and as with the  
trumpets of the morning, proclaim  
individual, social, civic and national  
righteousness. Declare that no moral  
leper shall legislate for a Canadian  
people—that what is morally wrong  
cannot be made politically right;  
announce—and all the sanctions of  
Sinai are with you—an equal punish-  
ment for unchastity in men and wo-  
men. Give yourselves to ceaseless  
crusades against drunkenness, proflig-  
acy and all forms of evil that de-  
teriorate and destroy; and dedicate  
yourselves to the building up of the  
ideal citizenship—keeping before you  
for sincerity and direction the awful  
vision of God's law, the awe-inspir-  
ing sense of His righteousness. This  
vision made martyrs strong and re-  
formers confident. One thing the  
weakest and humblest of you may do,  
live a life of faith in the Son of  
God; make the force of noble char-  
acter felt in daily life; and thus  
contribute to the building up of a  
righteous character and a righteous  
nation.

### PLATO'S HOPE FULFILLED.

Centuries ago Plato expressed the  
hope that at some future time the  
Moral Law might become a Person—  
clothing the imperative "ought"  
with the tenderness and attractive-  
ness of self-sacrificing love—that men  
beholding the personification might  
be entranced and transformed. As if  
to fulfil Plato's desire, Jesus Christ  
came, the embodiment of love and  
righteousness—to warm man's heart,  
strengthen his affection, refine his  
reason, enlarge his horizon and save  
his soul. Therefore like the learners  
of the olden time, I beseech you to  
see "no man save Jesus only." His  
mind guides, His mercy forgives, His  
love redeems and His hand leads  
unto the heavenly heights. Looking  
upward with Dante, we see His glori-  
ous chariot "sweeping along the  
confines of heaven, a sweet light  
about it and its wheels almost block-  
ed with flowers." He rises over each  
one of you in such majesty as to in-  
clude the excellencies of everything  
in heaven and everything on earth.  
I exhort you, emulate Him. Look  
up to him, as Dante midst the pitchy  
night looked up toward the star.  
For there is salvation in no other.

You recall Tennyson's picture of the  
English Isle "ere Arthur came."  
"There grew great traces of wilder-  
ness,  
Wherein the beast was ever more  
and more,  
But man was less and less, till  
Arthur came.

Then he drave  
The heathen; after, slew the beast,  
and felled  
The forest, letting in the sun, and  
made  
Broad pathways for the hunter and  
the knight  
And so returned."

"Wherein the beast was ever more  
and more, but man was less and  
less"—is that a picture of our life?  
Yet do not despair. Crown this  
Divine King Arthur, and He will slay  
the beast, and drive out the foes that  
have conquered us. He will restore  
all the waste places of the soul, and  
out of "its wild confusions bring  
settled peace and ordered beauty."

### CHRIST'S MISSION.

Jesus Christ—so sympathetic that  
little children ran unto Him and  
were not afraid of Him; so tender  
that He would not make a sinning  
woman blush by the gaze of His  
purity; so direct and faithful that  
the Scribes and Pharisees were mind-  
ed to kill Him; so human that He  
prayed for His mother; so Divine  
that He prayed for His enemies, and  
so full of love that He became obedi-  
ent unto death, even the death of  
the Cross, that He might save the  
world—is the ever satisfying  
answer of God to the everlasting soul  
hunger of all the children of men.  
To know Him, to see Him, to fol-  
low after Him is the sum of all ex-  
cellence. God give you this vision;  
pour out upon you, and all the  
youth of this generation, the spirit  
whereby all may see how God forever  
makes Himself "an awful rose of  
dawn" and how through every era He  
works in and for the world He has  
redeemed, till

"Out of the shadow of night,  
The world rolls into light,  
It is daybreak everywhere."

### TO THE GRADUATING CLASS

Members of the Graduating Class  
you stand at the meeting point be-  
tween the University and the world  
at the point of discovering how far  
the University has fitted you for the  
larger interests in national life, and  
at the point where you shall be-  
gin to demonstrate to society how  
much the University has helped you  
to the finding of your life. It be-  
comes my privilege to remind you  
that every age has had its own ideals  
and that the University has in ey-  
ery age been a powerful instrument  
in the preservation and maintenance  
of those ideals. You are Twentieth  
Century men and women; and I en-  
treat you to respond to your possi-  
bilities. It is forever true that  
"where there is no vision the people  
perish." The need of this age, of ev-  
ery age, is for men and women of  
ideals and you graduates and under-  
graduates who are to help shape the  
life of the century have the opportu-  
nity of recreating the ideal needed out  
of the material in your hands. See  
then that "thou makest all things  
according to the pattern showed thee  
in the Mount." There is an ever aug-  
menting demand for leadership of the  
highest power, for those who can  
"see": for those who can construct—  
men who under ideals that are ener-  
gies will do exploits. Mountain-sum-  
mit men, who can read the vision  
and give the interpretation to the  
hosts upon the plain, are needed for  
composure and guidance. The time  
calls for heroic leaders, not only with  
eyes to see; but wrists to seize and  
a resolute voice to proclaim the  
eternal verities. If service be a sac-  
rament, then at such an hour as this  
to hide is black cowardice and to be  
silent and uncertain is to play the  
fool. Jesus Christ, the one supreme  
leader, offers you life for life, guid-  
ance and companionship, accept Him,  
follow after Him. Unto this add  
steadfast loyalty to your good  
"house of men"—with all it has help-  
ed you to have and to hold. Other  
springs will write their names with  
violets for incoming generations; other  
classes will come to campus and  
hall of convocation for other men  
and women the earth will yield its  
increase and the heavens let their  
fatness fall; but Class of 1912 our  
hearts, our hopes, our prayers go  
down with you into the battle. For-  
ty-two men and women—what can  
you not become; what can you not  
do? Bold, steadfast, wise, expectant,  
With the odds eleven to one,

Play the game, play the game;  
When the match is safely won,  
Play the game, play the game;  
Be it play or be it strife,  
With the quill or with the knife,  
As at football so in life—  
Play the game.

When the ship has sprung a leak,  
Play the game, play the game;
