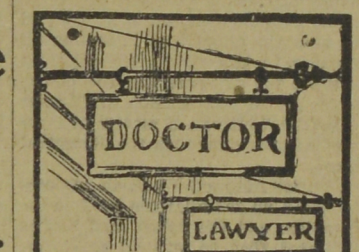

# WHAT HAS BECOME OF THE "ADJUNCT" QUESTION

(Halifax Recorder.)

President Taft intimated a short time ago that he would move for the repeal of the Reciprocity Act. Last Friday the Senate passed an Excise Bill, one clause of which provides for the repeal of the same act. All this is suggestive indeed. President Taft is the Republican nominee for re-election. He is feeling the public pulse and holding up a moist finger to test the direction of the wind, and is, of course, pursuing the policy most popular among the electorate. We take it for granted that practically the entire electorate of the United States are in favor of a union with Canada, just as the entire Canadian electorate would be in favor of the annexation of Maine, or the New England States, or Washington and Oregon. Yet neither country contemplates the forcible annexation of their hearts' desire. Every nation is quite willing to extend its boundaries and add to its strength, territorially or otherwise, if it can be done quietly and effectively without raising a rumpus. The desire on the part of President Taft and the members of Congress to bury the reciprocity policy as quickly and completely as possible is an evidence that the people of the United States have no faith and had no faith from the beginning that the policy of reciprocity would have any effect whatever in drawing the political bonds closer. And more than this, it is a very direct proof that the American electorate has very largely been all alone of the opinion that the proposed bargain was so pre-eminently in favor of Canada that their leaders who proposed it were traitors to the interests of their country. Now that the blind fury with which the policy was assailed in Canada has passed away, we can look at the matter more clearly and recall certain facts to mind. Those opposed declared that our whole agricultural and fruit-raising population would be ruined by American competition; yet we find that the entire farming and fruit-raising classes in the United States were fanatically opposed to it, and raised the "blue ruin" cry in deafening volume, declaring that the free entrance of competing products from Canada would strike a fatal blow at American prosperity and force hundreds of thousands of United States farmers to emigrate wholesale to Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. With equal rage and fanaticism did the lumbering interests oppose the proposal. The great manufacturing interests also opposed it because they feared that if the oppressed consumer once got even the faintest taste of freer trade that prohibitive duties were doomed. The great moneyed interests as a whole were equally opposed, fearing that the masses might take things in their own hands and loosen the grip

which the Wall Street plunderbund had upon their throats. Yet if all these people believed that such a trade agreement meant the absorption of their northern neighbors, no such opposition would have been offered, for their pride in national aggrandizement is as great as that of any other class in the country. More than that, there can be no shadow of a doubt that the wealthy "Interests" south of the boundary pooled their interests with the "Interests" north of the boundary to bring about in Canada the defeat which they were unable to accomplish of reciprocity in the United States. All this means that the American people did not for one moment believe that Mr. Taft was scheming for the "unconscious" absorption of Canada; that they did not believe that reciprocity would have any effect in bringing such a thing about; that the advantages of the proposed agreement emphatically were on this side of Canada, and that Messrs. Fiddling and Paterson drove a magnificent bargain for their own country. When we add to all this that Mr. Roosevelt did not understand Mr. Taft's "adjunct" letter to have any political suggestion at all, and that the President himself denied emphatically that he had any such thing in mind, it becomes apparent to all save the most stupid or perverse that reciprocity had no sinister significance even in the minds of its makers.
