## SUGGESTIONS FOR THE COOK

Two fresh eggs, one cup of sugar, one cup of flour, two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice and a teaspoon of lemon extract, one teaspoon of bak-  
 ing powder, one-fourth of teaspoon of baking powder, one-fourth of a  
 teaspoon of salt, one-half cup of hot  
 water. Separate the whites and  
 yolks of eggs; beat the whites until  
 stiff, and add to them half the sug-  
 ar. Beat the yolks for five minutes  
 without stopping, and add to them  
 the rest of the sugar and the lemon  
 juice. Beat the two egg mixtures to-  
 gether, fold and cut in the flour  
 with a wooden spoon (do not stir  
 it in, works on the top,) and lastly  
 add the hot water. Sprinkle a little  
 sugar over the top and bake in an  
 ungreased tin for 30 minutes in the  
 most moderate of ovens. Leave in  
 inverted pan until cool.  
 Two eggs are about the least num-  
 ber that can be used to make a  
 cake with any of the sponge quali-

ties. This one may not answer all  
 the requirements of the type—yel-  
 low as gold, tender as whipped  
 cream, velvety as junket—yet it does  
 not compare unfavorably with  
 sponge cakes made with three, four,  
 five and six eggs, if it is carefully  
 made. Served with fruit or custard  
 sauces, which more or less  
 distract the attention from the cake  
 if they are good, this will pass as  
 excellent.

Such a cake cannot be as yellow  
 as gold. In fact, it is likely to be  
 light in color. With the best of beat-  
 ing it is difficult to make it of as  
 fine a grain as cake with more eggs  
 because of the water and baking  
 powder used.

These same portions of flour and  
 sugar (one cup of each) may  
 be used with cakes of three, four, five  
 six eggs, lessening the amount of  
 water and baking powder all the  
 time until in the six egg cake

There are sponge cakes made with  
 cold water, sponge cakes made with  
 hot water; sponge cakes made with  
 neither water nor milk. There are  
 sponge cakes (a cup of eggs, a cup  
 of sugar), hoiled sponge cakes in  
 many other differentiations.

In the last generation an exactly  
 opposite opinion prevailed—powdered  
 sugar was the only thing to use if  
 you wished for a tender cake. But  
 this was also in the day of using  
 cornstarch in order to get the fine  
 grained cake.

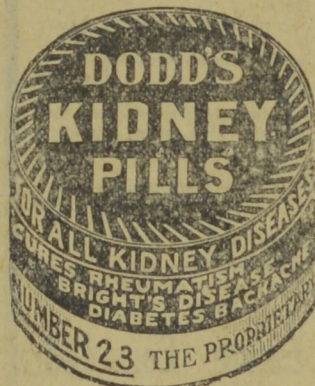

### TO BREAK THE NEWS TO TAFT

Washington, D. C., July 31—Men  
 who will be prominent in the notifi-  
 cation of President Taft of his re-  
 nomination began to arrive in the  
 capital today. Much public interest  
 is manifested in the notification exer-  
 cise, which are scheduled to take  
 place at the White House tomorrow  
 afternoon. If the weather is favor-  
 able Mr. Taft will receive the notifi-  
 cation committee on the rear portico  
 of the executive mansion, which over-  
 looks the ellipse and down past the  
 Washington monument toward the  
 Potomac. He will speak from the  
 portico, with the committeemen  
 grouped below him on the lawn. At  
 the conclusion of the ceremonies the  
 visitors will be the guests of the  
 President at luncheon.
