TURKS AND BULGARIANS

(Continued from page one)

London, Nov. 17—The negotiations
for an armistice have failed and the
Bulgarians today opened the attack
against the Turks all along the Tchatalja
line. The heavy artillery
duel continued throughout the day.

It appeared to be a Bulgarian pre-
paration for an infantry attack. The
Turkish fleet participated vigorously
in the defence at the Marmora end
of the lines and presumably Turkish
warships assisted at the Black Sea
end also.

Nazim Pasha, the Turkish command-
er-in-chief, in a despatch this even-
ing, claims to have repulsed the Bul-
garian attack and destroyed three
Bulgarian batteries.

No news of the battle has been re-
ceived as yet from Sofia and no in-
formation as to the strength of the
forces engaged on either side.

Nazim Pasha's headquarters are
near the Hademkui railway station.
According to the latest reports the
battle ceased with nightfall.

The Bulgarian government organ,
Mor, reverts to the subject of peace
and plainly intimates that the allies
are prepared to consider the question
of an alliance with Turkey, provided
the latter promptly accepts their
terms, which would give Turkey the
opportunity of welding her territory
into a modern state and making
friends of her conquerors.

The Balkan states clearly have in
mind the formation of such an alliance
as would be able to defy Euro-
pean interference in the disposition
of the spoils of war.

Every day brings fresh despatches
recording the terrible spread of cholera.
It is now stated that there are
a thousand cases daily, with a mor-
tality of fifty per cent., which the
Turkish authorities are impotent to
take any measures to prevent its
further spread.

FERRIBLE CONDITION AT CON- STANTINOPLE

Constantinople, Nov. 17—(By in-
direct route)—There are now over a
thousand cases of cholera daily in
and round Constantinople, and the
death rate has reached 50 per cent.
The refugees are quite unable to cope
with the situation.

On Thursday last 3,000 cholera pa-
tients arrived by train at San Stepha-
no. They would have been brought
out but for the protests of the rail-
way company and the Austrian am-
bassador, who asked that they be
sent to the Lazaretto at Beos and
Smidt.

For twenty-four hours the patients
remained in the train on a siding at
San Stephano without water or food
or any medical attention. Then
they were shipped to the quarantine
station. If they had been the lower
order of animals they could have not
been more neglected.

Yesterday a foreign doctor assist-
ing in the military hospital, discov-
ered by accident that five soldiers
dying of cholera had been placed
among the wounded. He ordered
their removal. Bearers took up the
dying men on their shoulders, but
their condition was such that he or-
dered the bearers to drop them. This
they literally did, and the unfortun-
ates were left lying in the mud for
an hour, groaning and in convulsions
before they were removed on stretch-
ers.

An extraordinary feature of the
conditions behind the Turkish lines
at Tchatalja is the indifference of the
army to the presence of unauthorized
visitors. Any foreigner wearing
either a fez or a European hat
may hire a vehicle and drive to the
Turkish entrenchments and inspect the
troops.

There appear to be no cordons to
prevent fugitives from returning to
Constantinople.

BATTLE AT MONASTIR

London, Nov. 16—The Uskup cor-
respondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs
Saturday night at midnight as fol-
lows:—

"A battle is proceeding at Monas-
tir the Turks number 45,000 with
forty guns. The Servians number
more than 100,000 with two hundred
guns including Siege guns and how-
itzers.

"No attempt has been made to
take the town itself by assault. It
is intended to force the surrender by
the aid of the artillery alone. The
Turks occupied excellent positions
around the town.

"The Servians were obliged to ad-
vance across soft marshes and were
exposed to the enemies fire. They
moved forward with their habitual
courage covered by a heavy fire from
their own guns and occupied line
running from Tchailiar, past Be-
harilar, past Peranz, an important
position 400 feet high to the hills of
Terro, O'jakovo and Gofeche.

"It is said that all the Bulgarians
have departed from Adrianople, the
investment of which had been left en-
tirely to the Servians. The Bulgarians
have gone to Tchatalja. No at-
tempt is being made to storm the
forts around Adrianople, the Ser-
vians being content merely to iso-
late the city."

Athens, Nov. 16—The commander
of the Greek fleet reports that boat
parties from his ships have landed in
the Gulf of Montepasanti and occupied
Mullani Island and the port of Dafni
on the Athes Peninsula, near Karies.

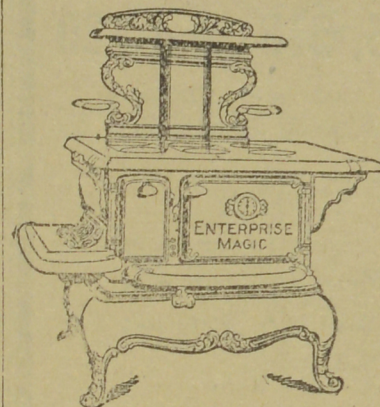

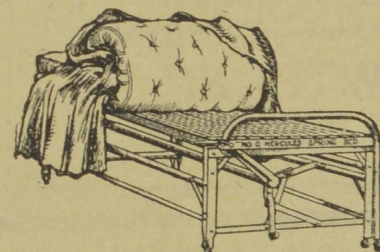

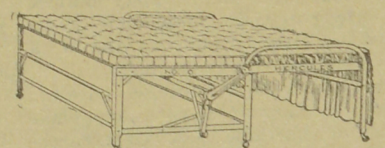

Dublin, Nov. 16—King Nicholas of
Montenegro, in a letter to a Dublin
correspondent, says:

"Love of liberty and Christian faith
are the standard of life of Irishmen
and Montenegrins."

"Irishmen and Montenegrins have a
common standard of life, love of lib-
erty and Christian faith," says the
letter. "Gladstone was a great
champion of the sacred cause of the
Balkan people and would have been
glad to see both nations marching on
the same royal path and the Balkan
alliance fighting for the same ideals
as your noble country."

TERMS OF PEACE.

London, Nov. 16—Bulgaria's terms
of peace to Turkey as reported at
Vienna and sent from that city by the
correspondent of The Daily Telegraph
consists of seven stipulations. In-
cluded in the first stipulation is the
surrender of the Tchatalja army and
its withdrawal, guarded by Bulgar-
ians.

The second provides for the evacua-
tion by the Turks of Adrianople,
Scutari, Monastir and Janina. The
third calls for the payment of a war
indemnity. The fourth demands the
surrender of conquered territory.

The fifth provides for the opening
of the Dardanelles and the making of
Saloniki a free port.

Since Bulgaria already has expressed
a willingness to leave the status of
Constantinople, and the Dardanel-
les to the powers, says the cor-
respondent, the fifth and sixth clauses
of the terms as reported here appear
improbable.

BULGARIAN DEMANDS.

London, Nov. 16—A despatch to
The Morning Post from Constantin-
ople, says:

"Kiemil Pasha, the grand vizier,
called at the Russian Embassy today
and conferred with M. De Giers, the
ambassador, on the subject of peace,
in the presence of M. Poyoff, first
dragoman of the Bulgarian legation,
who has been staying at the Russian
Embassy since the outbreak of the
war. The Bulgarians demand the
surrender of the Turkish army at
Tchatalja, as a necessary condition
to the cessation of the advance on
the capital and the Turks had forty-
eight hours in which to arrive at a
decision. This period having elapsed
and the Porte growing uneasy, Kiemil
Pasha visited M. De Giers.

"News arrived here last night that
Pdosto, a port on the Sea of Mar-
mora, held by the Bulgarians, is in
flames, and that the Turkish troops
are bombarding all along the coast,
but to no useful purpose."

CROWN PRINCE WELCOMED.

The Daily Telegraph's Uskup cor-
respondent under Thursday's date,
says:

"The Crown Prince, who left here
yesterday to rejoin the Serbian army
before Monastir, arrived at Philip-
this afternoon. He received an en-
thusiastic welcome from the inhabi-
tants of the city who strewed the
road with flowers.

"While the reception was in pro-
gress the sound of guns twenty-five
miles to the southwest announced
that the Battle of Monastir had be-
gun. All the news thus far received
here is that a Serbian cavalry divi-
sion operating between Philip and
Monastir came in contact with a
Turkish column consisting of a regi-
ment of infantry, a squadron of cav-
alry and a battery of artillery. The
Serbian artillery at once attacked
the enemy near the village of Dobro-
mira. Despite the fire of the Turkish
guns the Servians forced the column,
which formed the advance guard, to
retreat, and by a successful flank
movement the column was obliged to
retire toward Novatz, from its main
body.

UNDER SPEEDY TRIALS ACT.

Judge Wilson of the York County
Court, interviewed William McVer-
rach at the county goal Saturday
and the prisoner, who was sent up
for trial by Police Magistrate Marsh
for robbery at Jonah's Hotel, Cross
Creek, will be tried before His Honor
under the Speedy Trials Act on
Tuesday, November 26.
