BOY STOLE WATCH
FROM FOSTER-PARENTS
AND LEFT CITY

John Chisholm, Adopted Son of Mr. and Mrs. George Offen Disappeared Saturday Night—Second Act of Kind on His Part

John Chisholm, between fourteen and fifteen years of age, the adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. George Offen of this city, left his home Saturday night and has not been heard of since. A gold bracelet-watch, valued at forty-five dollars, and the property of Mrs. Offen, disappeared at the same time and the conjecture is that Chisholm has it. A year ago last June the boy stole a small sum of money from his foster-parents and left home. On that occasion he reached Fredericton Junction by rail and from that place walked to Tracey Station, where he was located and brought back.

BELONGS TO BOSTON.

The boy was a waif in Boston and was adopted from a foundling's home in that city by Mr. and Mrs. Offen about two years ago. On the former occasion on which he left home Chisholm was trying to make his way back to the United States and Mr. Offen thinks he is doing the same this time. The chief of police, to whom the case has been reported, thinks he has gone to St. John.

ALSO STOLE BICYCLE.

The boy had been employed by A. H. Farrell, plumber, as a helper. He was paid his week's wages Saturday and went home to his evening meal. After that he left home and has not returned. Mrs. Offen became anxious on account of the boy's continued absence and by telephone it was learned that he had not returned to Mr. Farrell's shop Saturday night. It was learned however, that a bicycle which had been stolen from an employee of the New Brunswick Telephone Company named McCarron, had been found in the cellar of the shop. The bicycle had been taken apart and the tires were missing. It is supposed young Chisholm stole the bicycle and disposed of the missing parts.

WANTS WATCH RECOVERED.

Mr. Offen is exceedingly anxious to recover the watch and states that the Reformatory is the place for the boy, who is incorrigible. When last seen Chisholm wore a new pair of Hartt shoes, black stockings, knickers of a brown mixture serge coat, blue reefer, blue cap and a blue cloth shirt with white buttons. He is of swarthy complexion with brown hair and eyes. A boy corresponding with this description is said to have gone to Victoria Mill Saturday night by C.P.R.

MR. JESSOP LEAVES

POLICEMAN FOSS
DISMISSED FOR
DISOBEDIENCE

Was off His Beat Saturday Night—William Hughes Appointed to Police Force Today—Another Appointment Later

George Foss was dismissed from the police force yesterday by Chief of Police McCollom. The dismissal was made because Foss contrary to orders was not to be found on his beat Saturday night from ten o'clock till some time after eleven. He is said to have been in a restaurant in Regent Street during the time he was not on the beat. Chief of Police McCollom visited the keeper of the restaurant and drew his attention to the fact that under the Police Act he was liable to a fine of fifty dollars for allowing the policeman to be about his premises.

Foss twice before severed his connection with the police force, once as the result of a change in the composition of the City Council due to an election and once of his own accord being dissatisfied with conditions then prevailing in the police force.

NEW POLICEMEN APPOINTED

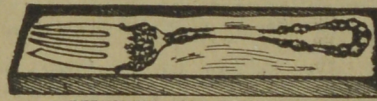

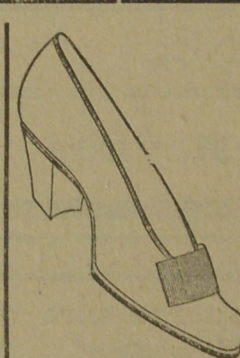

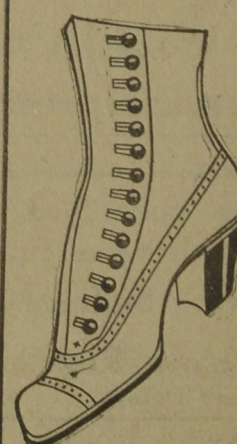
