BUILT FAST BOAT

IN HIS DREAMS

(Marine Engineers' Journal.)

The days were short and the nights were long when I lay in bed thinking, as many men do. I built a steamboat of steel. She was 210 feet long and 40 feet beam. She had triple expansion engines with twin screws 8 feet drain. She had two Scotch boilers and used oil for fuel and carried 200 pounds of steam and was capable of going 23 miles an hour. She drew 8 feet of water aft and 5 feet forward and had a large tank forward so as to tip her in going over the shoals. She had overhanging guards and underneath the sponsors were tanks to hold the fuel oil and the bunkers held a reserve supply of Sydney coal for emergency cases. She was fitted with an electric plant and had a steam steering engine and a steam wench forward and aft. She was to run on schedule time like a railroad train. The staff in charge of the engine room were three engineers, three oilers and three firemen, and they had eight hours' watch, so that there was an engineer, oiler and fireman on duty all the time. The boat, the "City of Fredericton," left the Celestial City at 7 a. m. on the down trip and made no stops but wharf stops or stations on the river, arriving in St. John at twelve noon, and leaving St. John at 2 p. m., due at Fredericton at 7 p. m. same day.

NEWS FORECASTS

NEW PROFESSORS

FOR ACADIA COLLEGE

Acadia University has taken steps in advance in providing a separate Professor for each language. Last year Prof. W. H. Thompson, Ph.D., took charge of the Latin while Prof. R. V. Jones, Ph.D., continued with the Greek. This year a professor has been appointed for French and another for German.

Dr. Adolf F. Herrman has recently been appointed to the chair of German. He is a native of Germany, holding the degree of Reifezeugnis from the Realgymnasium, Berlin, having received the Harnisch Prize at that time. After graduating he studied in Jena, Berlin, Kiel, Grenoble, and Paris. He holds a Diploma from the French University of Grenoble, and the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the German University of Kiel. He has taught in the Universitätschule of Professor Rein of Jena and in other schools in Hamburg, and London. German has never received the attention that it merited in the Maritime Provinces, but now at Acadia we may expect a most thorough department.

The Professor of French is John Rice, Ph.D. Dr. Rice is a citizen of the United States and at the age of eleven went abroad on account of his father's health and spent the next five years on the continent, largely in France but also in Germany and Italy. After a year in an American preparatory school he entered Yale University and graduated in 1900 with a high oration standing. In 1901 he took his M.A. at Yale, and in 1902 was awarded the Scott Hunt Fellowship. In 1903 he was appointed Instructor of French and German in the Sheffield Science School of Yale University, and in 1904 Instructor in French which position he held until 1909, when he took the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. He had since been instructor in Williams College, teaching besides French, Spanish and Italian. He has kept up his connection with his work abroad in spending a portion of 1909 in Spain and Portugal; 1904 in Italy; and has spent frequent summers in France since. Dr. Rice was informed of his appointment while in Paris and is now on his way to Wolfville.
