## A QUEBEC REVOLT

At a banquet given in his honor at Levis, P.Q., on Saturday, Hon. L. P. Pelletier, the ghostmaster general in the Borden cabinet, announced his intention of remaining in public life. In other words, he gave his friends to understand that he intends resisting to the utmost the demand for his decapitation now being made upon Premier Borden by a certain element of the Tory party in Quebec. His decision will not clear up the political atmosphere in the Quebec district where prominent Tory leaders are in open revolt against the ghostmaster general and several of them declined to have anything to do with the banquet given in his honor. Press despatches announced that Hon. J. D. Hazen and Hon. J. D. Reid attended the function but they failed to disclose the fact that Hon. F. D. Monk was conspicuous by his absence. It is noticeable too, that no mention was made of Mr. Rodolphe Forget, M.P., the well known Montreal financier, who contributed very liberally to the Tory campaign fund at the last election and was largely responsible for Hon. Mr. Pelletier's elevation to the cabinet. Mr. Forget, a few days ago, admitted that he had been the means of securing a portfolio for Mr. Pelletier, but said he, "It was the mistake of my life and my only excuse is that I did not know the man."

From a party standpoint Liberals will rejoice that Hon. Mr. Pelletier is to remain in the cabinet. He is fast breaking up the Tory party in the Quebec district and a Liberal should not raise any objection to his being allowed to finish his work.

Attorney General Grimmer has gone to investigate a charge of partisanship preferred against Mr. James Friel, clerk of the peace and judge of probate for Westmorland county. Tory politicians have been clamoring for Mr. Friel's dismissal ever since the present government came into power and are determined to oust him from office. Acting Premier Grimmer, much against his better judgment, no doubt, has consented to hold an investigation. The only real complaint against Mr. Friel is that he is a Liberal and therefore should not hold office under the Fleming government.

Winnipeg Free Press.—It may be taken for granted that the maximum capacity of each Dominion for defence can only be developed by the establishment of local navies. A policy of contribution is freighted with danger. It will never command that measure of popular support necessary to make a system of defence effective. There may be ample justification for contribution as an initial, but detached phase of our policy, but the only policy which will permanently commend itself to the people of Canada is one providing for a Canadian navy upon some such lines as those adopted by Australia.

Toronto Globe.—Mr. Borden and his supporters have shown such a complete lack of shame in spoils dismissals that the employing of a British under-secretary to report on the Dominion departments causes misgivings. If Sir George Murray is to be made the scapegoat for another chapter in the story that is disgracing Canadian administration he should be informed of the fact. He can have no suspicion of the methods that the Borden government have embarked upon.

Commodore Stewart, the bachelor statesman-journalist of the Miramichi, says that potatoes are selling in Chatham for eighty cents a bushel. The Commodore probably buys his potatoes by the peck, therefore the cost is not a matter of great concern to him. Not having a family to support he does not find it necessary to buy in large quantities in order to get the benefit of lower rates. This being so it is to be presumed he does not keep very well posted on produce market prices, although we understand he always knows what is going on in the stock market.

Hundreds of sportsmen from the United States will visit the woods of New Brunswick during the next few weeks in search of big game. The old time prejudice against non-resident sportsmen has pretty well died out. They come to the province, spend their money liberally and take little away with them of any great value. It is estimated that half a million dollars is left in New Brunswick each year by visiting sportsmen.

Halifax Chronicle.—The Atlantic cable rates have been reduced through the good offices of Postmaster-General Samuel, but the Ottawa Tory correspondents will no doubt try to credit it all to our own "Ghostmaster-General" Pelletier. There must be something to show for his summer's junketing in Europe.

## THE WILL OF GEN. NOGI. MADE PUBLIC

Tokio, Sept. 16.—The will of General Count Maresuke Nogi, who with his wife, the Countess Nogi, with the idea and purpose of demonstrating their devotion to their departed sovereign, Mutsuhito, committed suicide at the moment the body of the late emperor was started on its journey to the tomb, was published today.

The Japanese warrior says that he follows the emperor because his services are no longer required in this world. He had often sought to die, he adds, and chose as the occasion for his departure from this life, the present great national calamity under which the country is laboring.

The document left by General Nogi bears the date of the night of Sept. 12, twenty-four hours previous to the taking of his life in a manner that startled the world, and it indicates that the death of countess had not been decided upon when the instrument was prepared.

General Nogi distributes his property among his wife and friends, and makes donations to a number of public institutions. He says that while his wife lives, the house of Nogi may be maintained, but after her death the line will be extinguished.

The Port Arthur hero suggests that his body be given to medical college requesting only that his teeth and nails be buried in the grave.

Admiral Togo visited the death chamber in which the body of the late Count Nogi reposes and remained for a long time kneeling. He was deeply affected. Prince Katsura, lord chamberlain, representing the emperor also paid homage to the dead general. The city of Tokio has presented Secretary Knox with a glass case flower vase and other gifts.

## THE STOCK MARKET

New York, N. Y., Sept. 17.—The market opening was quiet with a strong tone. There was no agreement in aggressive bullish operations but the market's underlying strength appeared to be asserting itself. In conservative quarters the view was expressed that the obstacle to an advance was the money situation, the comparative tightness of which is only a temporary factor. In Canadian Pacific there were gains of 1½ to 2½. The advance was believed to reflect increased confidence on the part of insiders that the government would permit the company to make a new issue on terms conveying valuable concessions to the stockholders. Erie was a strong feature, opening up ½ at 36½. Erie issues have been helped by favorable developments in which Forgan interests are said to be interested.

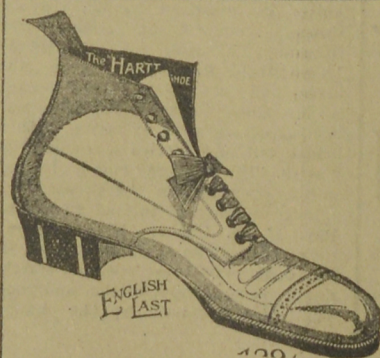

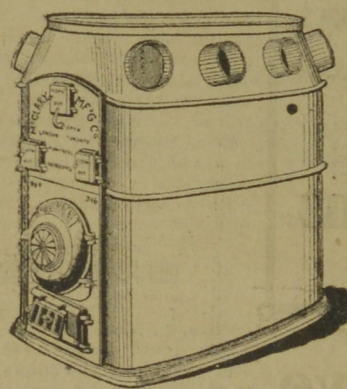

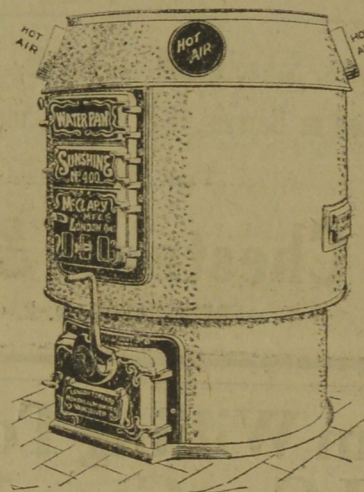
