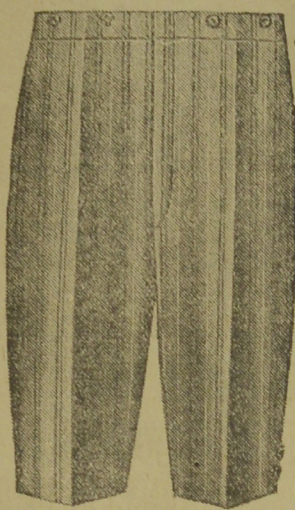

## TIMBER SHIPMENTS.

Farnworth & Jardine's wood circular dated Liverpool Sept. 1, says of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia spruce and pine deals: "The import to the Mersey (including Manchester) amounted to 14,250 standards, compared with 15,780 standards during the corresponding period last year, by far the greater portion arriving at Manchester; deliveries have been satisfactory, amounting to 8,050 standards, as compared with 8,280 standards last year; stocks are not excessive, being 2,000 standards less than at this time last year; tonnage remains very scarce, even at present high rates. Pine deals continue in fair demand at unchanged prices."

London, Sept. 17—Warner U. Van Norden of New York was in consultation yesterday in Plymouth with General Booth and Col. Kitchen of the Salvation Army. The Army is planning the immediate establishment of work in China.
