COY BLOCK TO BE SOLD TOMORROW HAS INTERESTING HISTORY

Previous Buildings on Site Destroyed by Fire—Brisk Bidding Expected In Wednesday's Auction Sale

The Coy Block, one of the oldest business buildings in the city, is to be sold at public auction in front of the County Court House at noon tomorrow under a decretal order of the Supreme Court. The property is being sold for the purpose of settling the estate of the late Catherine E. Coy, who died intestate.

HISTORY OF BUILDING.

The building which is a brick structure of three stories with five shops on the ground floor, is situated at the corner of Queen and Regent streets. Its site has twice been unswept and the buildings which stood upon it were prominent in the business section of Fredericton of three generations ago. The great fire of 1850, which swept out of existence the greater part of this city, included in its sweep small one-story wooden structures which stood on the site of the present building, one facing Regent street and two facing Queen. After the fire a large wooden building was erected which also was used for business purposes. Some years later, fire, which originated in the old Waverley Hotel on Regent street, owned as is the present hotel building, by the Grieves family, destroyed all buildings on that corner of Regent and Queen streets. The present brick structure was then erected by the late John Coy. The late Amassa Coy was also interested. The builders were John Maxwell, still living in Fredericton, and James Burdill. The two upper stories of that portion of the building next Regent street were for some years occupied by the late John Coy as a dwelling, and later by Miss Catherine E. Coy until she removed to Montreal some years ago.

LIVELY BIDDING EXPECTED.

The property is a very desirable one and in view of the fact that considerable development is expected in Fredericton in the near future, should prove valuable not only on account of the shops it contains, but also as an office building. Ald. C. A. Burdill, who is a tenant of one of the shops, is spoken of as a probably bidder and Ald. Hugh Calder and other real estate men of the city are said to be after the property. Outside parties are interested in a similar way. Lieutenant Governor Wood is to attend the sale, Mrs. Wood being one of the heirs at whose request the sale is made.

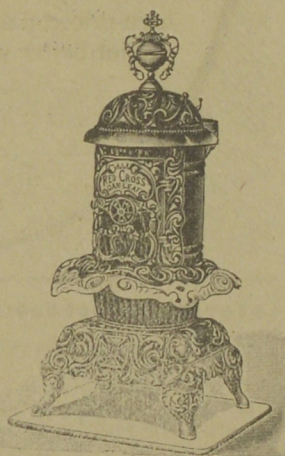

ABDUCTION CASE REPORTED FROM ST. MARY'S RESERVE

Indian Girl, Thirteen Years of age, Said to Have Been Taken to Tobique by Indian Living There

According to reports from the St. Mary's Indian Reservation there are complaints that a young girl, thirteen years of age, has been abducted and that she is now at some place on the Tobique, having been taken there by an Indian who is a resident of that district.

The first intimation that the girl had been taken away was received yesterday when a squaw was seen at the C.P.R. station in a very excited state. She would give little information concerning her trouble but from what she did say it was gathered that the girl had been induced to leave her home by a Tobique Indian, and had left St. Mary's by rail. The abduction, it is said, took place on Saturday.

It is not known what will be done in the matter but an effort to locate the girl probably will be made.
