Washington, D.C., Nov. 90-With the opening of the final session of the Sixty-second Congress but two days away, senators and representatives from near and far are pouring into capital today on every train. Heavily loaded baggage trucks pro-claim to the people of the streets that law-making is about to be re-sumed. The hotel proprietors, boarding-house keepers and restauranteurs again have put on smiles that won't come off for three months.

It will be a short session of course since it will expire by constitutional limitation on March 4. There may be some feeble attempts at construc-tive legislation, but they will amount to little, as politicians of both parties admit that the "three months is entirely too short a time in which to perform any important task along this line. 




