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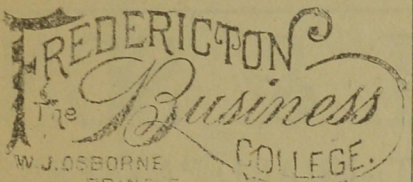
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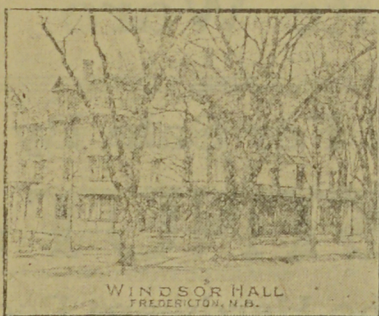

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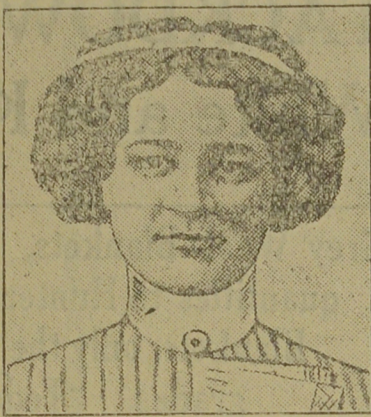

TORY OFFERINGS TO

London, Nov. 25—The Nation can-  
tains a whole-hearted protest against

the Empire to arm. It says: "The  
younger nations of the Empire are  
thereby drawn into the vices of the  
old ones. Incidentally, it trounces  
Mr. Borden for seeking to scare dol-  
lars from his countrymen, and pro-  
ceeds:—'If these benevolences were  
really spontaneous, proceeding from  
a reasoned-out colonial policy, we  
would regard them with unmixed fa-  
vor. The net results though, will be  
to inspire Germany with new suspi-

our naval superiority.'"

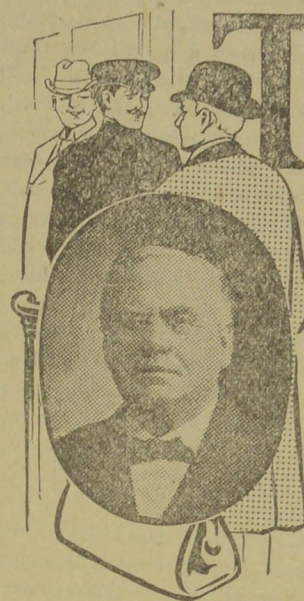
Lying on the desk of Commissioner

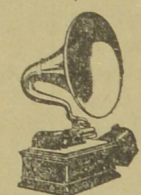
