TO QUERY ASQUITH ABOUT BORDEN'S "CRISIS"

Montreal, Nov. 27.—A Canadian Associated press despatch from London today says:

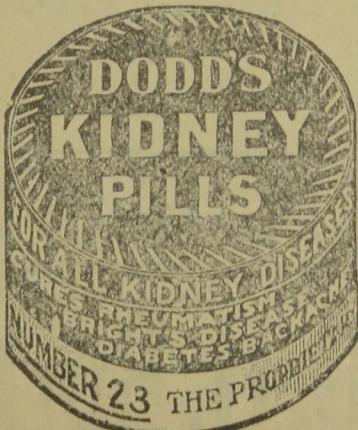
"Several correspondents of British newspapers are cabling long reports of the proceedings in Parliament at Ottawa. The Telegraph's correspondent today speaks of garbled reports from obscure English newspapers being transmitted to Canada to show that 'England is laughing in her sleeve at the expense of the Canadian jingoes.' The correspondent states that he showed the contract to Premier Borden, who merely smiled and said no reply from him was necessary."

"The Telegraph must, indeed have hunted in remote places of British Journalism for the morsel to lay before the Canadian premier. A careful scrutiny of the editorial opinions of the reputable press here on both sides of politics shows that nothing of the sort, or anything like it, appeared in any London or provincial paper of any standing. The whole trend of the editorial opinion here, as already indicated in previous cables, is that Canada's desire to share in the Empire's naval defence must not be taken as an excuse for Britain lightening her burdens as a world power through the assistance rendered by the dominions. Regrets are also expressed in some quarters that the dominion feels the necessity of following the older nations in undertaking the burden of armaments."

"Premier Asquith will be asked from the Liberal side of the house of commerce whether his attention has been called to the speech at the opening of the Canadian parliament declaring it imperative that the effective naval forces of the empire should be strengthened without delay. If so is the Canadian government warranted in coming to such a conclusion from information supplied by the imperial government? And whether the home government intends waiting for a Canadian contribution before strengthening the navy."

CONGRESSMEN ARRIVING

Washington, D. C., Nov. 29.—Every train arriving in the capital today brought its full quota of senators and representatives in anticipation of the opening of the final session of the sixty-second Congress. Before tomorrow night virtually the entire membership of both houses will be on hand in readiness for the call to order at noon next Monday.



NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Nov. 30.—The victors and vanquished in the recent congressional election will foregather at the Capital Monday for the opening of the final session of the sixty-second Congress. The session, which will expire by limitation on March 4 next, will be confined almost wholly to the passage of the appropriation bills and other business of a routine character. No important constructive legislation is expected.

Following custom, both houses will adjourn soon after their convening at noon on Monday out of respect to the memory of those members who have died during the recess of Congress. The President's annual message will be received Tuesday.

Decisions in some important cases probably the Union Pacific merger suit and the hard coal cases, are expected to be handed down by the Supreme Court of the United States, when the body convenes Monday after the Thanksgiving recess.

A public consistory, always an event of world-wide importance in Roman Catholic Church circles, is to be held in Rome Monday. Announcement is made that no new Cardinals are to be created at this time, but the red hat will be conferred upon five Cardinals who were unable to reach Rome in time for the last consistory.

Vice President-elect Thomas R. Marshall and former Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks are to be the guests of the Chicago Indiana Society at its annual dinner Saturday night. Mr. Fairbanks is publicly to advise Governor Marshall on how to be a Vice President.

The annual meeting of the National Rovers and Harbors Congress will assemble in Washington, Wednesday, and will be opened with an address by President Taft. The main purpose of the organization is to influence Congress in its legislation for river and harbor improvement.

A number of other gatherings of a national character are scheduled for the week, among them the annual convention of the American Road-builders' Association, in Cincinnati; the annual meeting of the American Automobile Association, in Chicago; the annual conference of the National Guard Association of the United States at Norfolk, Va.; the annual meeting of the National Civil Service Reform Association, in Milwaukee; and the quadrennial of the Federation of Churches of Christ in America, which will meet in Chicago Tuesday for an eight days' session.

SCOTS OBSERVE ST ANDREW'S DAY

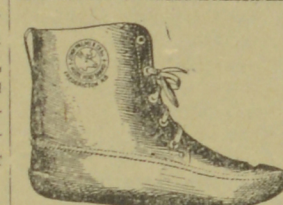
Chicago, Ill., Nov. 30.—This is St. Andrew's Day, and in honor of the occasion Scotsmen all over the world are proudly wearing a wee sprig o' heather, fresh from the misty purple hills of their native land. A Chicago boasts of a large number of citizens from the land o' cakes by brae and burn, and the annual banquet of the St. Andrew's Society of this city is invariably one of the notable social functions of the early winter.

Just how St. Andrew came to be chosen as the Patron Saint of Scotland is lost in the misty of antiquity, but from time immemorial her royal banner was the silver X-shaped cross of St. Andrew upon a blue ground. St. Andrew, of the twelve disciples, is reputed to have been crucified on an X-shaped cross, at Petras, on Nov. 30, A. D., 70, after a life spent in preaching the gospel and in relieving the distressed. To the true Scotsman, therefore the St. Andrew's Cross is at once emblematic of love for their native land and of fidelity to the strong faith which has ever characterized the Scottish people.
