BECOMES HEAD OF
PUBLICITY COM.

John T. Jennings on Account of Pressure of Business Resigns Chairmanship
---Arrangements for Distributing Booklets Have Been Made

The Publicity Committee met last night and transacted some business of importance. The resignation of Mr. J. T. Jennings as chairman, which was tendered some weeks ago was accepted and Mr. J. D. Palmer of the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company was selected to succeed him. Mr. Jennings' retirement from the office of chairman was caused by pressure of business. He still remains a member of the Publicity Committee and is also president of the Board of Trade.

Those present at the meeting were Ald. Calder, Ald. O'Neill, A. R. Slipp, M. P. P., Mayor Hooper, Ald. Guthrie, J. W. McCready, H. S. Campbell, Publicity Commissioner McDade.

The final proofs of the advertising booklet prepared by Mr. McDade was read and steps for distribution of 6000 copies were taken. The greater number will be distributed in the British Isles but 2000 will be distributed in Canada and the New England States. Advertising Manager Crichton of the I. C. R. and Mr. Timmerman, Industrial Commissioner of the C. P. R. have consented to assist in the distribution. As soon as possible 10,000 booklets along the same line prepared by Mr. McDade for the Dominion Immigration Department will be distributed.

RESOLUTION PASSED

The following resolution on the retirement of Mr. Jennings was passed: Whereas, the Publicity Committee of the City of Fredericton have received with deep regret the resignation of Mr. J. T. Jennings from the position of Chairman of their Committee.

And Whereas the Committee have taken into consideration the fact that Mr. Jennings has, since his appointment as Chairman of the Committee, given to the work in hand his most careful thought and attention and has displayed in the conduct of the Committee's affairs the most marked ability.

And Whereas the Committee realizes that Mr. Jennings is so occupied with the duties which devolve upon him as president of the Fredericton Board of Trade and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trade, that it is impossible for him to devote the time and attention which he would like to give to the position as Chairman of this Committee.

Be it Therefore Resolved that this Publicity Committee of the City of Fredericton do place on record its hearty appreciation of the effort's that have been put forth and the tireless energy exhibited by Mr. Jennings in connection with his duties as President of the Board of Trade and Chairman of the Executive Committee as well as Chairman of this Publicity Committee and to express their deep regret at his decision in consequence of the arduous and multifarious duties which devolve upon him.

ENGLISH BUYER
OF REAL-ESTATE
IN CITY TODAY

W. G. Pine Coffin of London Here For Purpose of Inspecting Properties--- Interested in Farm Lands--- Says Province Needs Advertising

Mr. W. G. Pine Coffin of London, England, who is interested in New Brunswick farmlands and other real estate from the viewpoint of the investor arrived in the city last night registering at the Barker House. Today he met several local men who are concerned in real estate and also looked over some properties. Mr. Coffin was in the province in the spring of 1911. On his present visit to New Brunswick he was accompanied by Mr. R. F. H. Suhr of the Canadian Improved Farms Company, London, and Mr. C. Stewart Bellhouse, Wantage, England.

NEED OF PUBLICITY

As far as New Brunswick is concerned Mr. Coffin is of the opinion that publicity and advertising are the two great necessities in Great Britain. The province and what it has to offer are practically unknown to the intending British settler or investor. Organization in the matter of attracting settlers and disposing of them when they arrive are what he considers important. The daily papers in Great Britain he considers a better advertising medium than special periodicals. Better faith with immigrants he also says is necessary.
