POLITICS AND THE CANADIAN CLUBS

(Calgary Albertan.)

Attention is directed by The Vancouver Sun in an opportune editorial to the non-political character of our Canadian clubs, which of late seems to be in danger of being ignored.

During the past few weeks each city on the direct route between coast and coast has been invaded by successive parties of Britishers who enjoy more or less prominence in public life. The greater number of these gentlemen have been ardent Unionists. Visiting this country ostensibly for purposes of business or pleasure, they have been good enough to turn aside occasionally from these pursuits to educate us through the medium of the interview on the subject of imperial politics. By a process of subtle suggestion they have endeavored to convey to our minds the impression that the only form of true patriotism is that of the British Unionist and his Canadian Tory associate. They have opened their hearts to us and have told us of their fond hope that they will be able to celebrate the obsequies of British Liberalism on their return to England. They have declared their unalterable conviction that Great Britain will be at war with Germany next week and have hinted, in the most delicate manner possible, their belief that Mr. Borden's naval policy should receive the support of all Canadians, no matter what that policy may be.

It is perhaps, not fair to blame these gentlemen for expressing their views on these interesting subjects when they are asked by the interviewer to do so, although we must confess to the feeling of admiration for the distinguished British Liberal M.P., who, in Winnipeg recently, declared that he thought Canada capable of managing her own affairs unaided by his advice or by that of his Unionist associates.

We incline to the view that it would be unreasonable, even were it expedient, to expect these gentlemen to restrain themselves when provoked by the inquisitive interviewer. The most distinguished of their number, however, are almost invariably asked to address the Canadian Club in the city where they are visiting. Here their liberty of speech is rightly restricted by the non-political character of the organization. Reports of some recent utterances indicate that these gentlemen have supposed, either that the Canadian Club was a Conservative club or else that Canadians, being a people of high intelligence, must all necessarily be Conservatives. A suitable hint from the officials of the club might therefore, quite properly precede the invitation to speak. We can quite readily conceive that men, whose fine abilities have won for them distinction in British public life, would not be much exercised to find subjects of greater interest to us than their view on the German menace and Canada's naval policy.

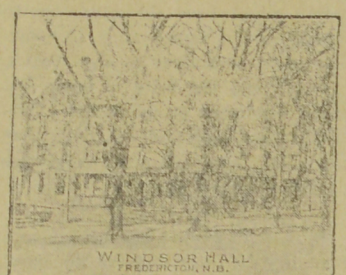
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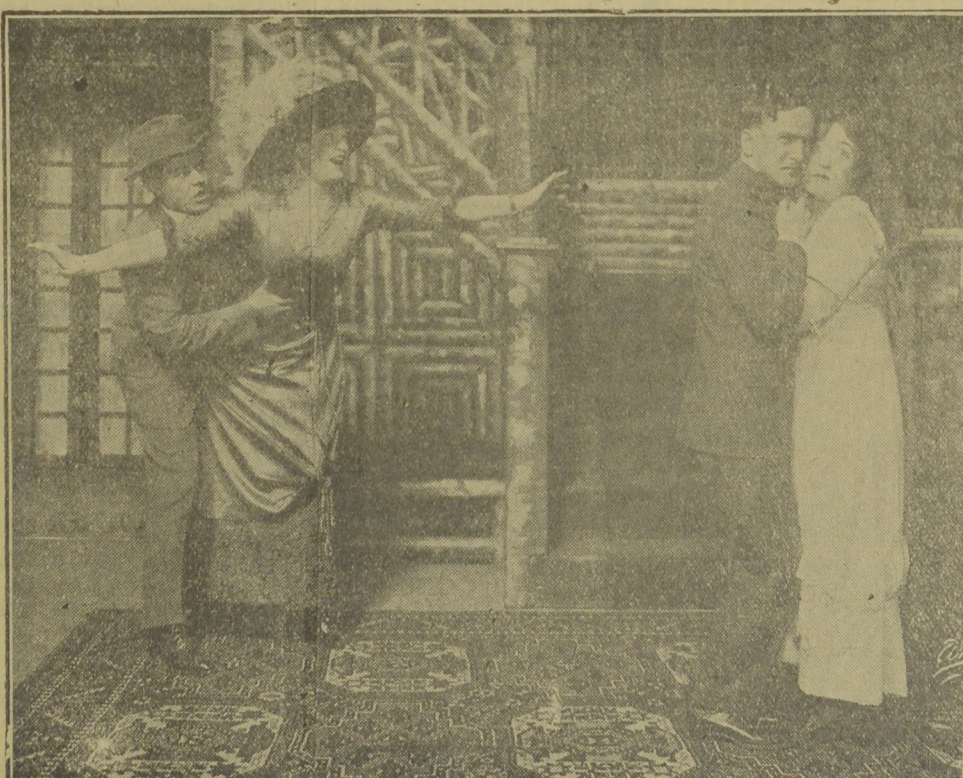
