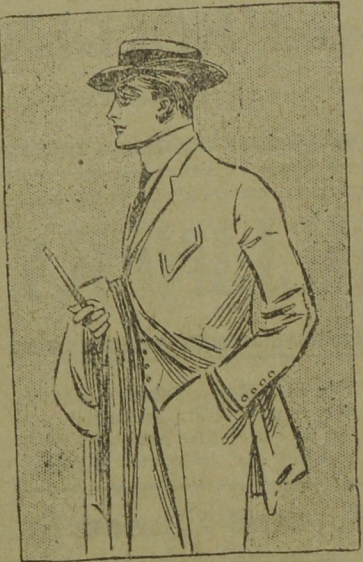

### COLLEGE "FRATS" AT TORONTO BREAK INTO FOOTBALL

Favoritism in Choice of Players is  
Alleged—Greek Letter Societies  
Now in Bad Odor

(Montreal Herald)

Persistent rumors have reached Montreal of possible friction in University of Toronto football circles, over the continued attempts of certain of the fraternities to monopolize the places on the Rugby teams especially the first fourteen which has three times won the Dominion championship. Friends of the inter-collegiate game in Toronto, who want to see the best team turned out, whether composed of men acceptable to the fraternities or not, foresee troubles if present difficulties are not smoothed over soon. McGill, as the most feared team, will be intensely interested in the outcome.

A former Toronto Varsity man now in Montreal says that non-frat men are already being delegated to the side lines, and made to cool their heels there, while those of the "elite" who seem to have much less Rugby ability are given every chance nearly forty men out at Varsity oval this week, it is fairly easy to slight some of the men without to get into shape. As there are arousing any general antagonism, but resentment is growing at the fact that somehow these men on the side lines are invariably those who do not belong to one or other of the Greek letter societies. These have been growing in strength and influence at Toronto during the past few years much faster than any other Canadian university, and graduates fear for the result, athletically and otherwise, if some halt is not called in the near future.

"There may be some open ructions before the season has progressed very far," said a Toronto man, who claims to know, who dropped into the Herald office Friday.

### BOSTON WELCOMED SOX FAVORDD IN BETTING

Boston, Sept. 23—The Boston Red Sox, returned from the west today as champions of the American League, one of the greatest welcoming demonstrations ever accorded an athletic team in this city. Conservatively estimated the crowds, which lined the mile of city streets through which the players, passed in automobiles on the way from the Southern Station and which gathered at the Boston Common where the welcome was formally made, numbered over 100,000 persons.

Business was temporarily stopped all along the line of parade, while thousands of workers thronged to the windows. Street car traffic was stalled by the crowds and incoming trains and hurrying commuters at the South Station were alike held up by the great jam at that place.

At the Common the welcome was official as well as popular. Mayor Fitzgerald presided and gave the keys of the city to the team, no member of which owns Boston as his home. In common with other speakers who included District Attorney Joseph C. Pelletier and Sheriff John Quinn, jr., the mayor expressed the hope and belief that the Red Sox would be victorious in the world's series in October.

Manager Jake Stahl, responding in behalf of the team said: "This great demonstration will be an inspiration to us in the games ahead."

All the other players appeared, and a few said words of thanks for the welcome.

Boston opens at Fenway Park tomorrow a four game series with the New York Highlanders, the last in the city until the club comes home for the world's series.

### RED SOX FAVORED

New York, Sept. 23—Baseball followers, judging from the wagers that have been made in the financial district on the approaching World's series, favor the Red Sox to defeat the Giants. It is reported today that there is little Giant money to be had in the Wall street section. Odds of 10 to 9 in Boston to beat the Giants were recorded today.

Several small wagers at 10 to 8 that Boston would win from New York have been made. A prominent commissioner stated this morning that he thought the Boston contingent would have to offer 10 to 7 1/2 in order to bring out the Giant money.
