### THE SCOTCH IN FOREIGN ARMIES

(From the Westminster Gazette)  
A contemporary paper has recently drawn attention on the occasion of the Kaiser's attendance at the Swiss manoeuvres to the considerable number of foreign names in the Swiss army list. Far more remarkable however is the number of Scottish names in the Prussian and more especially in the Dutch Army. The exploit of Campbell of Craighish of the Bismarck cuirassiers, who captured a French eagle in the cavalry charge at Mare-la-Tour, in the Franco-Prussian war is well known to military fame. It is not so generally known that the majority of the officers of the Dutch Army are of Scotch descent and patronymics: Fergussons and Macdonalds, Pattisons and Grathams fairly bristle in the Army list. It is even more remarkable that these Scotch patronymics are practically confined to the Army. The training of the Thirty and the Seven Years' Wars seems almost to have made of them a Dutch fighting clan.
