## DETROIT AND RICHILIEU HAVE TAKEN ON LIFE

New York, N. Y., July 17.—The market opening was dull and irregular, showing comparatively little effect of unsettlement in London, caused by a decline in consols to the lowest prices touched in two or three generations. Room traders were bullish and in the Commission House the sentiment was far from optimistic. Stocks, however, appeared to be well taken. The strength was shown by the northwestern group. Great Northern opened at 136½, a gain of ½.

Northern Pacific opened at 120½, up ½. St. Paul was unchanged. The strength testified to improvement in the crop outlook.

The break of a point of U. S. Steel was reflected in the opening decline of ½ point, the stock recovering ½ on the second sale. Traders still attached a great deal of importance to the Stanley report and predicted that Steel would break before the general market could be expected to rally.

Ottawa, July 16.—R. L. Richardson, Editor of the Winnipeg Tribune, and ex-M.P. for Lisgar has been offered the Liberal nomination for Macdonald, the seat of which in the commons, is vacant by the appointment of W. D. Staples, as a member of the Grain Committee. If Mr. Richardson accepts he will be given the endorsement of the Federal party and should win. Mr. Staples majority last year was about 160 and as the trade issue is a vital one in the rural districts of Manitoba, any advocate of larger markets should be able to win, especially in view of the weakening of the Rogers-Roblin influence by the failure of their telephone and elevator policies.

Paris, July 16.—President Fallieres today on the advice of the French cabinet granted a pardon to Gustav, Herve, the anti-military agitator and editor of the Revolutionary organ La Guerre Sociale, who was sentenced on Feb. 23, 1910 by the Seine Assize Court to four years imprisonment on a charge of incitement to murder and the glorification of crime contained in an article he had written in praise of an Apache who had killed a policeman.

ed with Great Britain, or even the United States. Fortunately as yet the problem of poverty, of slum conditions, of the increasing urban and declining rural population, of the criminal classes, of the dominating influence of the money traffic, have not become as acute with us, as they have in Great Britain and the older countries of Europe, and in some sections of the United States. But already there are sufficient evidences of them to awaken us from our self-satisfied condition. Just as our country increases in wealth and population, just as the cities grow in size and influence, just as our foreign population increases, so will these conditions become acute, unless we grapple intelligently and courageously with the situation at the present time. It should be our supreme ambition to remedy the existing evils in our social system, to change the existing tendencies that are prejudicial to the highest welfare of the whole people and to prevent so far as possible, the development of these menacing conditions in the future.
