Three Races Won in Straight Heats--Bingas won 2.15 Trot and Pace in 2.15--Bottom, Local Horse Favorite in 2.24 Trot got only Second Money Race Going to Achilles the Great--Minnie won in 2.25 Trot and Pace--Baring and Belka Favorites

A fast track and ideal weather greeted the opening day of the mid-summer meet at the Fredericton Association's track yesterday afternoon but the attendance was slim. The afternoon's races went off without a hitch and all three races being won in straight heats, were completed shortly after five o'clock. In the 2.15 Bingas which had been replaced by Mary Cromwell as favorite in the pool-selling proved too much for the Halifax mare which got second money. Minnie favorite in the 2.25 Trot and Pace pulled out victorious in straight heats. Bottom one of the few local horses appearing during the day was second in the 2.24 Trot although the favorite, the race going to Achilles the Great. All the winners were driven to new marks.

2.15 TROT AND PACE

From the first it appeared that Warman with Bingas had the race well in hand. The first heat was in 2.16, Candy Girl was in good form and beat Mary Cromwell out for second place. The Halifax mare came back in the other two heats however, and captured second money. Bingas did not have to break the track record to win although it had been stated in some quarters that either he or Mary Cromwell would make a new record. The best time was 2.15 in the second heat Bingas getting a new mark.

2.24 TROT

Achilles the Great with Musgrave driving had no trouble in the 2.24 Trot capturing first money. Bottom owned by L. B. C. Phair of this city was a good second in first and second heats but in the third broke badly and got on his feet again only to be placed third. Bottom finished in fourth place in this heat but Little Bertha was put back for persistent breaking. Vaulton after finishing in fourth place in the first and second heats came in a good second in the third. The best time for the race was 2.20 made in the first heat.

2.25 TROT AND PACE

The 2.25 Trot and Pace furnished some of the best racing of the day. Minnie won in straight heats her best time being 2.17 a new mark. The fight was for the division of the balance of the money. Miss Lightfoot was second in first and second heats but was beaten out for second place by Miss Wilfred in the third heat. Shadland Faustta came in for fourth money coming in third in the second heat.

"We had no chance to get Chase," said Comiskey, "without weakening our Club more than Chase would have strengthened it. No trade would be agreed to by New York that would not leave a hole in the home team that it would be immediately necessary to fill with a good man." Comiskey did not make known the names of the players mentioned in the attempted trade.
