OPENED SESSION TO-
DAY IN Y.M.C.A. HALL

Addresses of Welcome by Mayor Hooper and Dr. W. H. Steeves— Importance of Examination of Children's Teeth Emphasized

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS BY
DR. F. C. BONNELL, ST. JOHN

Care of children's teeth and the necessity for dental hygiene in the public schools composed the key-note of the addresses delivered this morning at the opening session of the 22nd annual meeting of the New Brunswick Dental Society held in the Y. M. C. A. Building, York Street. These points were touched upon in several reports and addresses and the need of dental examination in the public schools emphasized.

About thirty delegates from various parts of the province are in the city to attend the annual meeting of the dentists. The attendance being very representative. The program as published previously is to be followed—papers and discussions taking up the most of the time today with the clinical portion coming tomorrow morning. The election of officers may take place today or tomorrow. Thursday afternoon will be devoted to recreation. Dr. A. T. McMurray of this city making the arrangements.

ADDRESSES OF WELCOME.

Addresses of welcome were delivered this morning by His Worship Mayor Hooper on behalf of the city and by Dr. W. H. Steeves on behalf of the dentists of Fredericton. His Worship in his speech of welcome, referred to the fact that Fredericton on account of its situation, environment and natural beauty, was an ideal convention city. This was the fourth which he had had the pleasure of opening during the summer and he was ready for Teddy Roosevelt should he see fit to hold a "third party" convention in Fredericton. The dental profession, said His Worship, was one of great public benefit and one which deserved every encouragement. Dr. Steeves, in a brief address, bade the visitors welcome on the part of the local members of the profession and hoped that they would enjoy their stay in Fredericton. In the course of his remarks he referred to the death of the late Dr. Torrens.

Dr. F. A. Godsoe of St. John, replied to the two addresses on behalf of the visiting delegates. He made particular reference to the need of examination of the teeth of school children and of dental hygiene.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

The president, Dr. F. C. Bonnell of St. John, followed with a short address, in which he reviewed the work of the year which had been most successful and made more extended reference to the subjects mentioned by Dr. Godsoe.

Dr. Godsoe then presented the secretary-treasurer's report and also that of the registrar of the council. Dr. Magee of St. John, reported for the Dominion Council.

The evening session will begin at eight o'clock.

CATTLE POSTPONED

Board of Health will not Act re Moth Nuisance--Water Remarkably Pure

The Board of Health at a brief session held last night decided that as the city had acted in the matter of abating the moth nuisance the board would take no action.

Representatives of milk dealers appeared and stated that the testing of milk-cows during the hot weather would be disadvantageous to both animals and milk and asked that the test be postponed till cooler weather. The suggestion will probably be followed out.

Mr. Dibbles drew attention to the fact that no steps toward the erection of an isolation hospital had been taken.

Mr. H. H. Hagerman, official analyst presented a statement of analyses of city water during June showing that the water was remarkably pure. The analysis had resulted in a saving in the amount of chemicals used at the filtration plant to more than pay the salary of the analyst.

On the suggestion of the plumbing inspector it was decided to take steps to have necessary improvements made in the Crangle Building.

Mr. Daniel Palmer a well known Queens County farmer is among the visitors to the city.

JOHN HOWLAND
OF GIBSON REPORTED
FATALLY INJURED

Was on Corporation Drive near Woodstock--One Report is that he was Kicked and Caulked in a Fight

DRIVING COMPANY SAYS
HE WAS KICKED BY HORSE

John Howland of Gibson, who left on Saturday for the Corporation Drive near Woodstock, is reported to be seriously hurt and not expected to live. A message from the drive last evening to his wife was to the effect that she was to go to him at once. Mrs. Howland left for Woodstock this morning.

VARYING REPORTS.

Reports concerning the injuries received by Howland vary. One report which received wide circulation was to the effect that there had been a fight among the men employed on the drive and that Howland had been kicked about the head and had been injured by boot-caulks to such an extent that his death was expected.

From the office of the St. John River Log Driving Company at St. Mary's, the statement is given that Howland's injuries resulted from his being kicked by a horse. The man has been employed as a teamster and that fact lends support to the report received by the company.

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DOUBLE DROWNING
IN NORTH LAKE ON
THURSDAY LAST

Charles Graham and Llewellyn Kinney Met Death as Result of Overturning of Canoe--Their Companion Saved

VICTIMS BOTH YOUNG MEN
WELL KNOWN IN THAT SECTION

Word comes from North Lake of a double drowning on Thursday last in which two popular young men well known in the western part of the county. A third escaped with his life swimming ashore.

Those who lost their lives were Charles Graham and Llewellyn Kinney. They with a young man named Everett Farrell were crossing North Lake in a canoe. In some manner their craft was overturned and the three thrown into the water. Farrell was able to get a grip on the overturned canoe and made his way to shore. The others were unable to get to the canoe and struggled in the water for a short time. They sank with their arms about one another in plain view of a number of friends on the shore who were entirely helpless.

FUNERAL SUNDAY

The bodies of the unfortunate young men were recovered shortly after the accident and arrangements were made for the funeral Sunday at Fosterville. Graham was an Orangeman and was buried under the auspices of the Orange Order. Rev. C. McDonald conducted the double funeral service and preached a sermon from Hebrews 9, 27. The funeral was the largest ever held in the western part of York County.

WELL KNOWN YOUNG MEN

Graham was twenty-seven years of age and was a resident of the locality near Eel River Lake. Kinney was but eighteen years of age and was a resident of Pemberton Ridge. Both leave many friends and relatives to mourn their loss.
