**ROSS B. WINS 2.10 TROT,
2.06 3-4, 2.06 2.06 AND 2.06**

Grandson of Axtell Shows Class Racing at Lexington, Ky.--Baden Closes His Campaign With a Victory--Season's Earning More Than \$35,000--Don Pronto Lowers Record for Five-Old Pacing Stallions to 2.02 1-4

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 16--The feature of the Grand Circuit racing today was the performance of the bay gelding Ross B in the 2.10 trot. Despite his record of eight victories in nine starts, this good trotter from Illinois ran guideless in the speculation, but on the track he handled a splendid field comfortably in 2.06½, 2.06, 2.06.

Eligible to the 2.10 class when the race started, there are scores of men here who would gladly have paid \$10,000 to own him to carry over for the campaign of 1913. His three miles this afternoon were good enough to have won any stake race this season. At the finish of the second mile he was under a drive, but he came back in the same time the next trip looking for something to beat.

AXTELL'S GRANDSON

This latest sensation is a great grandson of Axtell, 212, through a line little known. Robert Milrot, the favorite, went the race of his life, as did Jack London and several others.

The wonderful Baden closed his campaign with a victory and the Massachusetts-bred stallion now has the honor of having won more money in a single season than any other trotter in turf history. His gross winnings in his 17 races are more than \$35,000.

He lost the first heat today by making a break in the stretch when seemingly winning easily. The next heat he came from behind and out-raced Anvil in the last eighth. The third mile he was in front all the way.

OTHER RACES

The local entry, Belle Ashland, won the 2.21 trot in straight heats as expected. The Massachusetts mare, Florina, and Miss Davis were inside the money.

Don Pronto, a half-brother to the Futurity winner, Maurice, lowered the record for five-year-old pacing stallions to 2.02½ in a trial against time.

Another capital performance against the watch was that of the trotter Deuchester, also a son of the Director General, who earned a record of 2.07.

The time trials of the day furnished two new 2.10 trotters, Angelo, 2.09½, by Lord Vincent and Axworthy, 2.14, a three-year-old son of Guy Axworthy and Miss Caleta, by Bingen.

Tomorrow, if the conditions are favorable, Walnut Hall Farm will start the futurity winner, Maurice, 2.07½, to beat the record for three-year-old trotters, 2.04½. The summary:

RED SOX GIVEN A RECEPTION BY BOSTON'S MAYOR

Formal Charges Made Against Fogel of Philadelphia National League Club--Must Prove Assertions

Boston, Oct. 17--Through streets lined by thousands of spectators, the Boston Red Sox, world's champions of 1912, paraded in automobiles today from Fenway Park to Faneuil Hall, where they were congratulated by city officials and thousands of the followers of the game.

The joy feast in Faneuil Hall was presided over by Mayor Fitzgerald, who congratulated the Red Sox for bringing the "pennant" to the city. The mayor said that Boston praised Christy Mathewson and the other New York players for their brave fight. The sentiment was loudly applauded by the Boston players.

Joseph Walker, former speaker of the House of Representatives, and others made addresses. Manager Jake Stahl and other members of the team responded, thanking the people of Boston. The players presented Manager Stahl and President James McAlister with loving cups. Hundreds of congratulatory telegrams have been received by the club from all sections of the country.

CHARGES AGAINST MAGNATE.

New York, Oct. 17--Formal charges against Horace Fogel, president of the Philadelphia National League Club, based upon his alleged assertion that umpires had favored the New York club and that this year's race had been fixed for that club to win, were ordered drawn at a special meeting here today of the National League of Baseball Clubs.

The charges will also include statements which President Fogel is alleged to have made at the Philadelphia baseball park at the last series played there with the New York team, an accusation alleged to have been made that the manager of the St. Louis club weakened his team by playing substitutes, so that the New Yorkers could win, and charges made by William Brannan, an umpire, whose fairness is said to have been impugned by Mr. Fogel.

"If we can prove that the National League race was crooked this year and that the umpires of the president of the league were parties to it," said President Lynch in a statement to the meeting, "then the umpires should be discharged and blacklisted from ever taking part in organized baseball and the president of the league should step down and out of his position in disgrace. On the other hand, if these charges cannot be proved then it is up to the National League to pass legislation preventing this man from representing a National League club in any capacity. I respectfully place this before you, gentlemen, and ask you your wish as to procedure in this case."

John A. Heydler, secretary of the league, was directed to prevent the charges to President Fogel within five days, and Mr. Fogel was given five days additional to draw up his answer. The league will meet in this city on Tuesday, Nov. 26, to hear Mr. Fogel's defense and take action in the matter.

Mr. Fogel was present out made no statement.

TO ATTEND CONSECRATION

Montreal, Oct. 17--Prelates and clergymen from various points arrived in this city today to attend the services of consecration of Rev. Heber J. The consecration is to take place tomorrow in Christ Church Cathedral and will be attended with all the pomp and ceremony prescribed for the occasion by the ritual of the church.

TOMATO BISQUE

Take one can of tomatoes, one onion and a soup-bunch, boil all together for an hour, strain and set away to cool. When needed, heat to boiling point; also heat a pint and half of milk and have ready butter and flour mixed to a paste for thickening. Put a half teaspoonful of bicarbonate of soda into the tomato and as it foams up add the milk and rub in the thickening. Season to taste and serve in a tureen.

ORANGE FRITTERS

Make a nice light batter of one-half pound of flour, a half-ounce of butter, a saltspoon of salt and two eggs, adding sufficient milk to make it the right consistency. Pare carefully and remove the skin from the orange. Divide into quarters without breaking the skin, dip each piece into batter and fry in hot lard. Drain on blotting paper. Serve in a napkin and sprinkle lightly with powdered sugar.
