TO RESTORE THE CEMENT DUTIES

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—The period set by the government during which half of the duty should be remitted upon cement imported into Canada expires on Oct. 31, and after that date it is almost certain there will be no remission of the duties paid.

The remission was granted as the result of strong representations from boards of trade and contractors of various western cities who were unable to procure the commodity from the Canadian companies.

The minister of finance recommended that half the duty should be remitted for those importing from the United States. The remission has extended over a period of about five months, during which time an immense quantity of cement has been imported, and a large amount of money returned to importers by the department of customs.

PROSPECTOR FOUND DIAMONDS.

W. A. Muir the celebrated northern Ontario prospector has just returned to Ottawa after a very interesting trip along the east coast of James Bay in quest of diamonds. Both he and his party paddled over 180 miles down the Mattagami river into the Moose river and thence to Moose Factory, where they secured necessary supplies for their long trip around the east coast of James Bay. The trip was one full of adventure. The coast line is shallow and consists of mud flats extending far into the bay and they had to hug the shore closely on account of the danger from storms. As a result the tides interfered with them greatly as in paddling along when the tide went down they would frequently find themselves stranded on extensive mud flats hence progress was slow and frequently they had to pack their supplies fully two miles to reach shore. On several occasions when camped where they thought they were on dry lands, winds and tides would swamp them in the middle of the night.

Muir and his party prospected all along the shores of the east main river and found large beds of blue clay which is described by geologists as diamond matrix. Several eminent geologists have pronounced this clay to be the real thing and the sample of diamonds found are thought to be excellent but have not yet been examined by experts. The country traveled over by Mr. Muir and his party in Ungava is poorly timbered, is desolate to look upon and shows no signs of possessing any game and only a few Indians were met. As the Muir party were leaving the country they met several other prospectors entering in quest of the precious gems. The examination of the specimens found by the Muir party should definitely settle the question whether or not real diamonds exist in the Ungava country.

GATHERING FOR DRY FARM CONGRESS

Lethbridge, Alta., Oct. 18.—The advance guard of delegates put in an appearance here today for the seventh International Dry Farming Congress. The exhibition of dry farm products will be opened tomorrow and there will be meetings of the various committees to complete the final details of the convention arrangements. The regular sessions of the congress will begin Monday and continue through the greater part of the week. The list of scheduled speakers includes nearly one hundred prominent agricultural experimenters. Thirty countries, including the United States, Australia, Russia, Turkey, France, Mexico and Hungary, will be represented. Both James Wilson, secretary of agriculture of the United States, and Martin Burroll, the Canadian minister of agriculture, are expected to address the congress.

TO KNOW A GOOD POTATO

(From the 'Steward')

The Irish potato is not Irish at all in its origin. As a matter of fact, says a writer in the 'Steward,' it is a native of the United States, and wasn't known in Europe until after Columbus had discovered America. It is also native to South America and has been grown wild both in Chile and Buenos Ayres.

It was first shipped to Spain from the neighborhood of Quito in the early part of the sixteenth century, first to England from Virginia in 1556. Sir Walter Raleigh first planted it in Ireland on his estate of Youghal, near the city of Cork. In 1587 it was first planted in Lancashire, England, from Sir Walter Raleigh's gardens.

Sir Walter Raleigh's experience was that he considered, with other people that the potato was a fruit (pomme de terre) 'apple of the earth,' and when the plant grew and the seed stock shot forth he perceived the seed ball upon them and concluded that they were the delicious fruit, and upon boiling them found they were not like what he had had, and only discovered his mistake when digging up the ground for other purpose.

Sir Walter upon experimenting found that treble the quantity of potatoes could be raised from the same parcel of ground as of any other vegetable, and immediately the potato became the principal food of the Irish peasantry.

Parmentier, the great Frenchman, introduced the potato into France under great difficulties. He wanted the French people to adopt the potato as food, but they would not even taste it until convincing with the authorities he succeeded in fooling them into using the potato.

He planted a garden in potatoes and made a big 'do' about them until they were ripe. He then was allowed a detachment of soldiers to guard them. The common people got interested and stole the potatoes from the garden and France became a potato eating country.

The German story of the potato is not known, but it is a great Kartoffel producing and Kartoffel eating nation and has given to America the German potato salad.

Bermuda and the West India Islands have been the source of supply for many years, but a new source has recently developed called the 'Early Garden of the United States,' which is the Gulf coast country of Southern Texas.

The first new potatoes that come from the locality (earlier even than the Bermudas) sell for \$4.50 per bushel. When they made their first appearance the whole Northern trade was surprised. Shortly after the new potato appears the price drops to \$1.25 a bushel by the carload.

The only way to test a potato so you will know to a certainty what it is and what it will do is to cook it. Mashed potatoes and baked potatoes have been harped on so much in this country that the stewards have lost sight of every other kind of potato.

For every kind of cooking they have been picking out a white, mealy variety that will fluff when baked, and burst open like popcorn when boiled. Then they wonder why the saute potatoes are not good and they can't get hashed browned out of the kitchen without being all mashed up.

For the potatoes which are to be cooked up light buy the kind that will, when cut in two, stick together. They will make fluffy-ruffle potatoes, but when you want potatoes which, when cooked will hold their shape, and do things in the manner you want them to, buy yellow ones that won't stick together.

Potatoes cooked in dry heat, as by baking in the oven, roasting in ashes, frying in deep fat, or steamed in their jackets, retain all their good qualities and flavors very much more than those cooked in water, but potatoes as thick must be served just as they are, deep (cooked to order)

TO DIVIDE ECCLESIASTICAL

Montreal, Oct. 17.—The twenty-first session of the Provincial Synod of Canada (Church of England) convened in this city today and was opened with a sermon by the Lord Bishop of Huron in Christ Church Cathedral. At the conclusion of the religious services the delegates adjourned to Synod Hall for the first of the business sessions. The meeting is regarded as the most important that the Provincial Synod has held in years. Before final adjournment is taken it is expected that definite action will have been taken for the formal division of the province into two metropolitan sees. At the present time the Provincial Synod embraces all of Canada from the Atlantic to Manitoba. The growth of the church and the consequent increase in the amount of work now call for a division into two synods in the opinion of the church leaders. It is proposed to create a new ecclesiastical province of Ontario to embrace the diocese of Toronto, Huron, Ontario, Niagara, Algoma and Ottawa. This would leave the old Provincial Synod of Canada to comprise the diocese of Nova Scotia, Quebec, Montreal and Fredericton. The division would necessitate the appointment of a new Archbishop and Metropolitan of the Eastern Provinces. The present Bishop of Quebec being the senior prelate, is prominently mentioned for the honor.
