

The fourth Triennial Provincial Exhibition which opened on Friday evening last... The Lunatic Asylum in Halifax is reported containing two hundred and seventy patients... OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—Toronto Exhibition has closed. It was very successful, the Stock being especially good.

Ten thousand persons visited the City daily. Kingston is the next place at which the Exhibition will be held. Accounts from Manitoba are unsatisfactory. Lepine has been assassinated on account of criminal intercourse with the woman of the house where he boarded.

The Half-breeds are moving in distant settlements at the instigation of Riel to take the control out of the hands of the loyalists. The British are not doing, but correspondents have exaggerated the situation somewhat.

French Canadian papers continue to publish injudicious articles concerning Manitoba affairs. The Premier has returned to Ottawa. South Sea Marie Canal on Canadian side will probably be constructed immediately.

THE CONDITION OF PARIS.—Advices from the King's headquarters at Versailles and from the forces at Melun represent that the Prussian line of circumvallation has been established around Paris perfectly.

THE DESOLATION OF STRASBOURG.—Five hundred houses were destroyed at Strasbourg by the configuration caused by the Prussian fire. Ten thousand of the inhabitants are homeless.

All reports agree that the fight was a severe and protracted one, but the Prussians, although temporarily forced back, at length succeeded in repulsing the French, who left in their hands many killed, wounded and prisoners.

The elections for a Constituent Assembly are indefinitely postponed by order of the national defence government within Paris, which rebukes the Tours government for exceeding its province and authority.

The army at Lyons is advancing by way of Nancy to relieve Bazaine. It was the right wing of this army which had a battle with the Baden troops on Thursday.

The Government of Prussia, though unable to recognize the actual Government of France, will not restore the Bonapartes. A decree has been issued annexing the Roman Province to the kingdom of Italy.

A despatch from Pekin states that the people have destroyed the Catholic building in that city. The Lyons newspaper of this city publishes a statement that Prince Gortschakoff demands of the Powers a removal of the prohibition against Russian war vessels in the Black Sea.

An engagement took place yesterday at Arzenay, in which the French were repulsed. Gambetta in making his escape from Paris in a balloon narrowly escaped death.
