HAY HARVEST.—The intense heat that has
been so trying in other parts has not as yet
made its way to us; on the contrary the
weather here for some time past has been
unusually cold and wet. Farmers whose hay fields
required attention grumbled considerably.
The salutations "disagreeable for the time
of year," "poor hay-making weather," &c., be-
came exceedingly monotonous. Those of us
who had no hay to make, but who by experience
know something of that phase of human
sorrow called the "tyranny of the atmosphere,"
fain hoped for a change. The sun has come
out, however, in his original majesty and
generosity, bathing us in a flood of good nature,
convincing us that this is not such a bad world
after all. The hay crop is heavier than it was
last year. Farmers are busy securing it.
The click of the scythe-stone is superseded by
the animating whirl of the "mower." Broad
acres of tall grass that stood proudly blooming
in the morning, lie prostrate and withering at
night, a fit emblem of this uncertain life of
ours. Our favored and beautiful Isle is clothed
in its most charming garb at present, giving
promise of an abundant harvest.

FISHING is carried on to a considerable extent,
and with comparative success. There are 180
seine boats in the bay at present, as well as a
large number of boats from the shore. Hake
fishing, which is by far the most remunerative,
has not as yet rightly commenced. The pros-
pect is quite good, however.

THE "political fever" rages amongst us.

for those who will not be returned to Ottawa,
