Great activity prevails at the gold mines in Guysboro.Co., and with good success.

The output of coal from the various mines up to the present time is consucrably larger than for the corresponding period of last year.

The "Rossinia," a large grain steamer while going out of Sydney harbor on Monday last, having no pilot on board, struck on the north bar. After discharging part of her cargo she was towed off and proceeded on her voyage to London.

The creditors of Robert Boak & Sons, Halifax have accepted 40 cents on the dollar, without interest, in four, eight and twelve months.

Over three months ago the ship "Edith 'Troop" was sighted off Cape Hatteras, and no tidings of her have since been obtained. She left New Orleans 104 days ago. Capt. Smith had his wife and child on board: they belonged sary. to Tiverton, N. S. The crew was shipped in New Orleans. The owners have filed claims for insurance, as they are satisfied that the vessel will never be heard from again.

A large fire broke out in a building in Annapolis Royal at about three o'clock Tuesday morning, last week, and burned from Wilson's Building to the Episcopal Church. About 22 buildings were destroyed in all. The fire is clearly the work of an incendiary.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

On Wednesday evening this city and vicinity was visited by a heavy storm of wind, rain and hail accompanied by thunder and lightning, which lasted for about a quarter of an hour. Although of so brief a duration it was a perfect tornado while it lasted, and we never witnessed so much rain fall in such a short space of time. The crops were somewhat injured by the rain, and damage was caused by ligtning in several localities. Yesterday morning there was another heavy rain fall during the continuance of which a valuable horse owned by Mr. Richard Jenkins of Lot 49, was killed by lightning.

The freight with which the steamer "Worces ter" sailed for Boston on Thursday, is valued at \$17,500. It consisted of 1978 boxes lobsters 1010 bbls mackerel, 62 bbls codfish, 538 cases eggs, 2 bbls 1 cask skins, and a few other small lots of produce.

During the thunder storm on Thursday night a man named James Kinsman, belonging to Miscouche, was killed by lightning while lying in bed, in a fishing house at New London Har-

The Standard's Plymouth correspondent asserts that an order was received on the 5th inst. for Royal marines to be held in readiness to proceed to Ireland on the 10th inst., if neces-

A Washington despatch of the 5th, says: Secretary Evarts has received a despatch from Constantinople saying that an American missionary named Harris has been murdered by Turks near the city. The Turkish Government promises reparation.

A despatch on the 6th says the troops are suffering greatly from heat in Afghanistan.

A Cabul despatch on the 6th says: Stores for thirty days have been provided for General Robert's expidition to Candahar. All the troops are concentrated to Cabul. The Candahar forces will be ready to march on Sunday; the rest of the British force in Cabul will march for India in a week.

The Indian troop-ship Euphrates sailed on the 6th with reinforcements.

The Times says that both from England and India reinforcements are being energetically despatched, and six battalions of infantry and three batteries of artillery will soon be passing through the Suez Canal. Without counting the recent additions thereto, the total number of troops occupied by the Afghan war is 60,000 of whom 40,000 are within the frontier of Afghanistan.

Advices from Havana dated Aug. 4th, report that official information has been received there of the unconditional surrender of Major Gene-Gorcia Inigues (Colixta Gorcia) Brigadier Geneal Foncia and thr e companies, being all that remained of the last expedition, that landed on the island of Cuba with Goreia.


