A BEGGERLY ACCOUNT.

Official statistics of pauperism in the State of New York for the year ending Nov. 30, 1878, show that the whole number of paupers relieved during the year was 166,849, and that the expense of their support and relief was \$1,636,567.27. The additional expenses of the officials distributing such relief were \$855,237.59, making a total of \$2,534,804.86.

Now let any man look into any poor-house under heaven, and what will he see? The Lord's poor, very few; "the devil's poor," more numerous; the poor wrecks, made such by rum, outnumbering all. The stamp of the rum devil's hoof is on almost every brow. Maniacs, made such by rum; old imbeciles, filthy, rum-soaked and tobacco poisoned; moderate drinkers, penniless, because they have spent their money for disease and death; destitute widows of dead drunkards; children made homeless and orphans by rum; girls seduced through intoxicating drinks; idiots begotten by drunken fathers; mothers whose drunken sons cannot or will not support them; and all this, that a swarm of unprincipled foreigners, with a few renegade Americans, to lazy to work, to proud to beg, and to timid to steal, may make a living by dealing out poison, death and damnation to their fellow men.

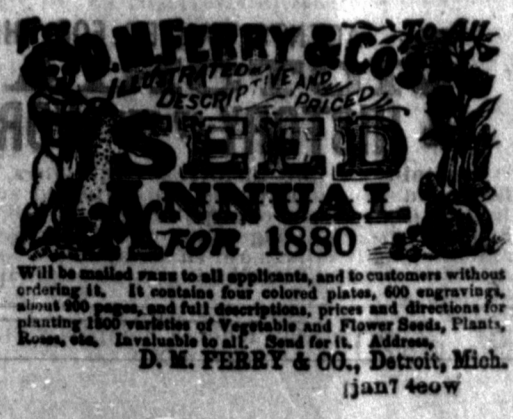
LEMON JELLY.—One box of gelatine dissolved in one pint of cold water; add three pints of boiling water, two pints of white sugar, and the juice and peel of three large lemons. Pour into moulds.

BUTTER TAFKY.—Two coffee cups of white sugar, three-quarters of a tea-cup of vinegar, three-quarters of a tea-cup of butter. Boil until brittle. Pour into buttered dishes.

SUET PUDDING.—One cup of chopped suet, two-thirds cup of molasses, one cup of sweet milk, one cup of chopped raisins, three cups of flour, one teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half nutmeg, steam one and one-half hours. To be eaten with sour sauce.

WAFERS.—One pound of sifted flour. Two tablespoonful of butter. A little salt. Enough milk to make a stiff dough. Rub the butter into the salted flour; wet with the milk; roll thin; cut into small round cakes, and roll these again into cakes as large as a tea-plate and as thin as stout writing paper. Lift carefully to a floured pan and bake quickly. They keep well.

CREAM CHOCOLATES.—One pound of sugar one cup of water, one-half pound of chocolate. Scrape the chocolate and set it over the teakettle of boiling water to melt into a paste. Boil the sugar and water ten or fifteen minutes, then take off and beat rapidly until it is creamy, flavor to taste, then roll into small balls, allowing a teaspoonful to a ball, then dip the ball into the chocolate until covered; for this you can use two forks, handling the balls carefully. Lay them on buttered paper to cool.
