A NEW CONTRACT has been entered into by Her Majesty's Government for the conveyance of additional Mails between England and North America, under which Mail Steamers will be despatched from Liverpool for Halifax and Boston; on every alternate Saturday during April, and the seven following months; and on every fourth Saturday during the other four months of December, January, February, and March; and vice versa from Boston to Halifax and Liverpool, on every alternate Saturday during May, and the seven following months, and on every fourth Saturday during the other four months of January, February, March and April. Similar voyages, alternately with the above, will also be made to and from Liverpool and New York, touching at Liverpool, until further notice.

With a view to commencing the New Service on both sides on 1st January, 1848, an Extra Mail will be despatched from Liverpool on Saturday, the 18th instant.
