Shipwrecks.—Ship *Oranston*, Cooper, master,
809 tons register, 29 days out from London, in bal-
last for this port, went ashore near Shelburne on
the morning of the 22d inst., in a thick fog. The
crew arrived here on Sunday morning in a schooner
from Shelburne, and report that the vessel would
become a total wreck. The *O.* belonged to T. E.
Millidge, Esq., of this city, and was a fine ship about
twenty months old. She was insured for £5,600.
£2500 in the Marine Assurance Office, £2000 in
the Mutual Safety Insurance Co., N. York, and
£1100 in the Warren Office, Boston.

Capt. Henley, of the steamer *Herald*, arrived on
Saturday night from Halifax, reports that the Barque
Princess, Newton, 39 days from Dublin, for this
port, was totally lost on Cape Sable, on Tuesday
night last, in a thick fog. Crew and passengers
saved. The *P.* was about 5 years old, 506 tons re-
gister, and belonged to Messrs. D. & T. Vaughan,
of this city. Vessel insured for £1500 in the Globe
Assurance Office.

Capt. Healy also reports that a Brig from Bor-
deaux, for this port, had been lost on Cape Negro.
The Barque *Bethel*, arrived Monday, reports a
full rigged ship ashore on Saturday last, on Cape
Sable, Seal Islands, the yards were lowered down,
and topmasts struck; appeared about 700 tons,
painted ports, and apparently new.
