This Presentment was read in open Court, and afterwards handed over by Judge Carter to Her Majesty's Attorney General, as a member of the Executive Government of the Province.

**Circuit Court.**—On Wednesday, John Haggerty, Joseph Corkery and Charles Hagan, were tried for a felonious assault upon His Worship the Mayor, on the 12th of July. Haggerty was found guilty, the others were acquitted. On Thursday, two men named Dawson and McNeil were tried upon a charge of arson, and acquitted. On the same day, Daniel Haggerty was convicted of an assault upon Alexander Boon, on the 12th July. Daniel Driscoll, Patrick Kearney, and Jeremiah McCarthy, who were indicted as being implicated in the attack on Mr. Boon's waggon, were acquitted.

The trial of George McKelvey, John Munford, Daniel Dunham, and Squire Manks, for illegal assembly, having taken part in the Orange procession on the 12th of July, resulted on Saturday last in an acquittal of all the parties.

Yesterday, Archibald Brown was tried for shooting at McAndrews, and acquitted. Thomas Nokes was also tried for the murder of Patrick Allan, and a verdict of not guilty was returned.

**NEW FREE SCOTCH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.**—The Corner Stone of a New Free Scotch Presbyterian Church was laid on Thursday afternoon. At three o'clock a large concourse of ladies and gentlemen proceeded from St. Stephen's Hall to the spot selected for the Building, in Sidney-street, where a great number of spectators were in waiting. On the arrival of the Pastor, the Rev. Mr. Thomson, and a number of the Clergy of the Free Church in this Province and Nova Scotia, at present holding their Presbytery deliberations in this City—the ceremonies were commenced by singing a Psalm, and a most powerful and effective prayer was delivered by the Rev. Robert Irvine. The Corner Stone was then laid by His Worship the Mayor, who, after performing this most pleasing and important part of the ceremony, made a few appropriate remarks, and concluded by thanking the people for the honor they had conferred upon him by requesting that he should take so prominent a part in the proceedings. Prayer was then made by Professor King, of Nova Scotia, and the assembled multitude separated.

We congratulate the members of the Free Church of Scotland in this city, at the advancement they have already made towards the erection of a Church, and we can say, that from the zeal, ability and christian bearing of their Pastor, they will at no distant day be one of the most flourishing christian denominations in this city.—*Temperance Telegraph.*

Previous to the ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new Church, as related above, the Presbytery of New Brunswick adhering to the Westminster Standards, met in this City for the purpose of inducting the Rev. John Thomson, A. M., late of Alnwick, Northumberland, to the pastoral charge of the Congregation recently organized in this City, in connection with that body, temporarily worshipping in St. Stephen's Hall, but for whom the above new Church is intended, and known as the "Free Scotch Presbyterian Church." The members of the Presbytery present, were, the Rev. Robert Irvine, of St. John, Rev. John Irvine, of Carleton, Rev. Andrew Donald, of Hammond River, Rev. John Turnbull, of Blackville, Rev. Angus McMaster, of Bay Chaleur, Rev. William Milen, of Bocabec, and Rev. Lewis Jack, of St. James. The Rev. Professors King and McKenzie, of Halifax, N. S., the Rev. Mr. Duff, of Lunenburg, N. S., and the Rev. Mr. Canning, of Ulster, Ireland, took part, by invitation, in the proceedings of the Presbytery. The Rev. John Turnbull, of Blackville, preached the Sermon, from Luke xii. 35 and 36; after which the Rev. Mr. Thomson, having satisfactorily answered the usual questions, received the right hand of fellowship from his Rev. brethren, and the Rev. Mr. McMaster, of New Mills, Bay Chaleur, addressed the Pastor and the People on their relative duties. The Presbytery then proceeded to lay the corner stone of the new Church, accompanied by the Independent, Reformed Presbyterian, and Methodist Churches in this City, the Building Committee, members of the Congregation, and others.

**HALIFAX AND QUEBEC RAILWAY.**—The Halifax *Acadian Recorder* of Saturday last contains the following despatch from Earl Grey to Sir John Harvey. It explains itself:—

Downing Street, 1st June, 1849.

SIR—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 101, of the 6th April last, transmitting an Act passed by the Provincial Legislature, to enable the Commissioners for erecting and building the Trunk Line of Railway from Halifax to Quebec, to construct the same within the limits of the Province, accompanied by Addresses from the Legislative Council and Assembly.

You will acquaint the Members of the two Branches of the Legislature that I have laid these Addresses before the Queen and that Her Majesty was pleased to receive them very graciously.

You will state to them that while Her Majesty's Government are most anxious to promote the proposed undertaking, they are not yet prepared to submit to Parliament any measure for that purpose; and without in any degree abandoning the hope that means may ultimately be found of executing so important a national work, they cannot disguise from themselves that the difficulties to be overcome are very great.

The Order of Her Majesty in Council, leaving the Act to its operation, will be forwarded to you by an early opportunity. I am, &c.

#### Western New-Brunswick Association.

The following Resolution was adopted at the last annual meeting held at St. George:

**Resolved.** That Rev. S. Robinson, Rev. E. D. Very, and Rev. A. McDonald be a Committee to make arrangements for the next Association to be held at St. John.

The Committee thus appointed propose that the friends who are disposed to exercise hospitalities to the Delegates and Visitors who shall attend from a distance (the number of whom will doubtless be large) that they give in to one or other of the Committee the number they can accommodate, that cards of direction may be handed to our friends on their arrival, to prevent delay on their part, and confusion on ours.

The Committee have made arrangements to have persons in waiting at the Colporteur Depository at Garrison & Marsters' Office, Custom House Building, Prince William Street, where a Book will be kept with the names of those prepared to accommodate, and with cards for the Visitors, who will all please call there as they come to town, and they will be immediately shown to places for their entertainment.

The Committee have further provided for the accommodation of the horses of those who come by land, directions for which also will be found at the Depository.

The Committee are not disposed by this arrangement to prevent our friends being entertained where it would be mutually agreeable, each one opening their houses being at liberty, if disposed, to state whom they prefer, and those coming also, so far as possible, exercising the same freedom. The Committee will do all that is possible to accommodate all parties, which may be accomplished with more ease and certainty as they think, by this system.

The Committee would call attention to the 2d Article of the Constitution, viz:

"The Association shall meet annually at 2 o'clock, P. M. on the first Saturday in September, at such place as they shall appoint, notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The meeting shall be opened with social conference, after which the Officers and Committees shall be appointed."

All Committees, it will be seen, will be appointed from those present on Saturday, P. M., to conform to the Constitution, and also that printed copies of the names of the several Committees, together with the arrangements for the religious services of the Sabbath may be placed in the hands of all the delegates on Saturday evening. All therefore desirous of participating in these important objects of the Session will, it is hoped, be in early attendance.

The Committee are assured that a strong desire prevails for a large delegation from Nova-Scotia, also from the Eastern Association of N. B., and also from Maine. We shall be prepared to extend a cordial welcome and abundant hospitality.
