There were about five thousand people on the shore when I reached it, from Cleveland, Willoughby, Painesville, and Fairport.

Steamboat Troy just in, and we are indebted to the Clerk for the following additional particulars:

The number of passengers on board the Griffith was—steering, 256; cabin, 45; crew, 25; total, 326. Not a female or a child was saved excepting the barber's wife. None of the books were saved.

Lost.—Capt. Roby, wife, and daughter; Michael Juno, 3d engineer; Mr. Mann, wheelman; Traley, 1st porter; Tillum & Paulding, saloon keepers; wife and children of Wm. Tincum; R. S. Pardu, of Beaver, Pa.; C. Leonard, porter; D. Webster, waiter; Mrs. Wilkinson and daughters, F. J. Champion.

In all about 250 lost—150 of whose bodies were lying upon the beach near the scene of the disaster when the Troy left.

Known to be saved, about 50; among whom are Mr. Stebbins, the 1st engineer; the clerk, Wm. Tincum, and Franklin Heib.

The Troy has nine dead bodies on board.

The flags of the shipping at this port were at half mast yesterday afternoon. The boat was insured for \$27,775.

**VIOLENT THUNDER STORM.**—Baltimore June 21.—Our city was visited this evening by a most violent thunder storm, which has done great damage to shipping and other property.

A THUNDER STORM on Friday was felt severely at New-York. Four houses in Thirtieth-street, were completely demolished. The men employed in them had a narrow escape with their lives.

A terrible hail storm passed over Alton and the vicinity, in Illinois, on the 3d instant; a stone dwelling was prostrated, great numbers of hogs, fowls, and prairie birds were killed, and trees and crops destroyed. Hail was found in a drift four feet deep.

The Steamship Viceroy sailed from New York for Galway, Ireland, on Saturday, with only 16 passengers. The Irishmen of New York presented a flag to her.

William H. Cocken, of Halifax, N. S., was drowned while bathing at Philadelphia, where he was studying law.

**NEW ORLEANS, June 14th.**—The Picayune says that the crevasse at Point Coupee is fourteen feet deep and 600 yards wide, sweeping off houses and crops and ruining plantations. It is still extending; all attempts to stop it have been abandoned. All Attakapas County stands in great danger of being submerged. If this should occur, hundreds of plantations will be destroyed.

#### THE ELECTIONS.

The Declaration of the new Representatives in the House of Assembly for this City and County, took place at the Court House yesterday—when Messrs. R. D. Wilmot, W. J. Ritchie, J. H. Gray, and Charles Simonds, were declared to be duly elected for the County, and Messrs. S. L. Tilley and W. H. Needham, for the City of Saint John, they having the largest number of votes. Mr. Partelow demanded a scrutiny of the votes given for Messrs. Gray and Simonds, and Mr. Ansley demanded a scrutiny of those given for Mr. Needham. The scrutineers are to commence before the Sheriff on Thursday next. Mr. Ansley also objected to Mr. Needham's property qualifications; but that question must be decided by the Assembly.

After the declaration proceedings had been gone through with, the members elect addressed the multitude of people assembled in front of the Court House, returning thanks for their successful support, and pledging their most strenuous exertions to carry out the promised measures of reform, establish public works, and advocate all measures calculated to advance the public good.

Mr. Needham proposed a vote of thanks to the High Sheriff and his Deputies, for their impartial conduct while holding the election, which was responded to unanimously.

**MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.**—A young man named Crowell, 19 years of age, son of Capt. Jabez Crowell, belonging to Barrington, N. S., was unfortunately drowned yesterday forenoon, at the end of the North Market Wharf. The body was recovered in a very short time, and every exertion was made to resuscitate him, but the vital spark had fled.—New Brunswick.

**NATURALIZATION OF ALIENS.**—An Act passed at the last session of our Provincial Legislature, provides that a person of Foreign birth taking and subscribing an oath before a Judge of the Supreme Court, to the effect that he has resided seven years in this Province, without having during that time been a resident in any Foreign country, and that he will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the Sovereign of Great Britain, and of this Province as dependant thereon, shall be entitled to the privileges of a natural-born subject of Her Majesty. The same Act also provides that any woman married to a natural born or naturalized subject, is to have the privileges of a natural-born subject.

**MACKEREL FISHERY.**—It affords us infinite gratification to learn that on all parts of the coast of the Province, the run of Spring Mackerel has set in in unusual quantities and of superior quality. The most cheering accounts have been received from the Eastern coast, and the Yarmouth papers mention that at Pubnico and vicinity the Mackerel Fishery was being prosecuted with great success. A gentleman from Margaret's Bay informs us that the fishery there presents the same cheering prospects.—Halifax Journal.

**EMIGRATION.**—Out of 10,000 passengers at Quebec previous to the 5th inst., it appears by official information that only 44 have been in the Hospital at the Quarantine Station.—But two deaths had occurred, and only 44 passengers remained on the island. Out of 45,000 arrivals at New York, this spring, the number of deaths is 53, and the number of births on ship board amount to 243.

A fine first class ship, of 758 tons, intended for the East India trade, was launched last week from the building yard of Messrs. Stackhouse & McLaughlin, Carleton. She is owned by the builders.

The violent thunder storm of last Thursday evening, extended along the American coast, and was very severe at Exeter, N. H., where it caused considerable damage. The lightning struck the stables of the Rail Road House, which were entirely consumed; thence the flames spread to the stables of the Swamscot House, which, with two adjoining houses, were also destroyed; likewise, the house and confectionary of Mr. Hervey, two taverns, and some other stables.
