

The Canadian Parliament was opened at Quebec, by the Governor General, on Friday last. Mr. McDonald, late Solicitor General, was chosen Speaker of the House. The Governor General in his speech, stated that Provincial securities were rising. The census showed a rapid advance of prosperity. The reduced revenue of the Post Office promises to be speedily made up by augmented business to the level of the expenses. Recommendations measures for the relief of Montreal, and a uniform currency, based on the decimal principle, for all the British Provinces. Attention to railways, and measures to render the Bonds of Canadian Municipalities more valuable. Alludes to the establishment of Steam Navigation from Europe to the St. Lawrence, and extensive emigration. Also reform in representation, in statistical department of feudal tenure, and in public provision for the insane. He lays on the table a despatch setting forth grounds on which the Derby Ministry refuse to introduce into the Imperial Parliament a Bill for giving the control of the Clergy Reserves to the Province, &c.

**PORT BURWELL.**—This Canadian Port, situated on the northern shore of Lake Erie, in front of a fertile and productive region of the Canadian Peninsula, is fast rising in commercial importance. It appears by a statement recently published in the Canadian papers that the value of exports from Port Burwell in 1851 amounted to \$142,724. This amount, however, gives but a very imperfect idea of the extent of her commerce, her exports consisting almost wholly of the bulky articles of lumber and timber. The country round Port Burwell is new and abounds with the products of the forest. Her exports in 1851 consisted 17,306,747 feet sawed lumber, 2,467,500 shingles, 694 cords of shingle wood, 13,603 logs, 137 spars and 6000 bushels of wheat. The exports employed 215 vessels and steamers, and nearly the whole were to the U.S., most of the lumber coming to Oswego by the Welland canal. Of the lumber, only 322,127 feet, and 83,000 shingles, went to Canadian ports; 119 spars went to Quebec. Port Burwell will become, in a few years, the depot of a rich and extensive agricultural country, now fast filling up.—*Oswego Times.*

**THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.**—On Thursday evening last, a meeting of the Local Committee and others interested in the success of this important project, took place in the Mechanics' Institute of this City. The chair was occupied by his Honor Judge Parker. Mr. Justice Street also attended, and took a marked interest in the proceedings. Dr. Robb addressed the meeting, and Mr. R. Jardine, Mr. I. Woodward, Mr. J. McLardy, and Mr. G. W. Smith likewise spoke on the occasion.

The drawing representing the proposed erection at Fredericton was shown to the meeting. The building will somewhat resemble that erected in this City last year, and, like its predecessor, promises to reflect credit on the taste and skill of the architect, Mr. Stead.

It gives us much pleasure to learn that the inhabitants of the Indian Town District, in the Parish of Portland, have agreed to avail themselves of the provisions of the new School Act, and have authorized an assessment to be made of the sum of £100 for the construction of a suitable School House in the district. This praiseworthy example—the first we have heard of,—we hope to see generally followed in other Parishes and Counties where the school accommodation is defective.—*Church Wil.*
