DEPARTURE OF HIS EXCELLENCY SIR EDMUND HEAD.—Last Saturday evening, His Excellency Sir Edmund Head, accompanied by Lady Head and family, arrived in this City, and proceeded to the Waverley Hotel, where he was received by a guard of honour from the 72d Regiment. Yesterday, His Excellency, with Lady Head and family, embarked at 3 p. m. in the steamer *Fairy Queen* for Windsor. Sir Edmund was accompanied to the wharf by Lieutenant Colonel Freeman Murray, 72nd Regt., the members of the Executive Council, the various heads of departments, Civil and Military, and some private gentlemen, all of whom took a respectful leave, with a wish for His Excellency's safe return. A guard of Honor from the 72d was drawn up in Water-street, and saluted His Excellency as he passed.

At 4 p. m. the members of the Council met at the Waverley Hotel, when Lieut. Col. Murray was sworn in as Administrator of the Government during the absence of Sir Edmund Head; after which the Council had a sitting and transacted Executive business. All the members of Council were present, except the Hon. Mr. Chandler, who is in England.

We understand that Sir Edmund will depart from England, on his return to this Province, by the steamer which leaves Liverpool the last week in July, his leave of absence being for three months only.—*New-Brun.*

THE APPOINTMENTS.—At the meeting of the Executive Council this week, several important appointments were made. We understand from good authority that the Law Commission consists of the Hon. W. B. Kinnear, (Solicitor General,) the Hon. Charles Fisher, of Fredericton, and James W. Chandler, Esq., of St. Andrews; with the Hon. J. A. Street, Attorney General, and the Hon. R. D. Wilnot, Surveyor General, as *ex officio* members.

It will thus be seen that among the paid Commissioners, the Government have been very cautious not to appoint any Members of the Assembly; and we trust the appointments will be satisfactory to the country.—*Courier.*

The Rev. James Porter has been appointed General Superintendent of Schools for the Province. This appointment will give general satisfaction; but most to those who know most of the talents, education and amiable deportment of the gentleman thus selected. The County Inspectors will not be appointed till the next sitting of the Council.—*Fred. Reporter.*

Saw-Dust Law.—Yesterday afternoon, at the Police Office, James Briggs, owning one of the Saw Mills on the Straight Shore, was convicted on the evidence of Mr. Murray the Harbour Inspector, of a violation of this law, and fined £20. The Common Clerk appeared for the Corporation, and Mr. Bayard for the defence. An appeal is spoken of.—*Freeman.*
