

at Buenos Ayres, a proclamation was issued by Urquiza, dated the 4th of February, at "Head Quarters, Palermo," and signed by him, as Governor of Entre Rios, and General-in-Chief of the allied forces, appointing as Governor pro tem. of Buenos Ayres, Dr. Vicente Lopez, who accepted and immediately made requisition on Urquiza for means or forces to suppress the disorders of the populace at Buenos Ayres.

Among the rigid orders for the occasion was the following: "Any person found plundering, shall be executed within one-quarter of an hour, and on the spot where taken."

It is stated that directly after the embarkation of Rosas, Gen. Mancilla disbanded his troops, who were disorderly, plundering and sacking the houses, particularly the street "Fedraeo;" when Urquiza ordered a division of infantry against the mob, killing 200, and better order was restored.

Montevideo dates of 8th February, report that Rosas would go to England in H. B. M. steamer Conflict—but was still on board the Centaur.

The dates from Buenos Ayres are to the 15th of February. On the 12th, the new government was organized.

The 18th of February was appointed for the public entry of the allied forces into the city of Buenos Ayres and great preparations were making for the event.

NEW YORK, April 24.—WEST INDIES.—Advices from Bermuda to the 5th, St. Thomas to the 27th, and Turks Island to the 17th, are received. Rev. A. Forrester, of Halifax, had arrived, to take charge of the Free Church of Scotland in the Bermudas. The brig Favorite was lost Feb. 22d. Some important regulations to ship masters, in consequence of French Guiana being a penal settlement, have been announced.

The Panama Railroad across the Isthmus is nearly finished; trains pass over it daily; this is an important improvement, and will be hailed with joy by thousands.

Whitney's great Railroad to the Pacific, has at last obtained a grant of land in aid of the work.

The receipts of gold at the mint in Philadelphia since January have been \$11,000,000.

LOSS OF THE KATE.—The ship Kate, Captain Mellin, which sailed from this port on the 3d inst. for Liverpool, was abandoned on the 7th, on George's Bank, waterlogged. The crew have arrived in Boston. The Kate was owned by Messrs. Kirk & Worrall.

The schr. Chebucto, from Halifax for St. John, with a cargo of sugar, drove from her anchors, and went ashore at Brier Island. She was got off with loss of rudder, but apparently no other damage.

The schr. Mary, from Wilmot N. S. for Boston with a cargo of wood, went ashore at Polly's Cove, Cape Ann, in the storm of 13th inst., and became a total loss. Officers and crew saved.

The schr. Colchester, McLellan, from Windsor N.S. for Boston, laden with plaster, went ashore during the storm on 13th, on the back side of Deer Island, Boston harbor. She had ten passengers, all of whom got ashore in safety.

Schr. Herald, Evans, of and from St. John, for Boston, was totally lost in the gale of Monday night, between Portland and Cape Elizabeth Lights—crew saved. Her cargo consisted of 500 barrels alewives, and 25,000 feet of lumber. At last accounts they were landing the cargo at Cape Elizabeth.
