SEAMENS' FRIEND SOCIETY.

At a Meeting held at the Grammar School in this City, on the Evening of Saturday the 20th instant—Mr. Justice PARKER in the Chair.

On motion of the Rev. W. Scovil, seconded by F. A. Wiggins, Esq., it was Resolved unanimously, that an Association be formed in this City, on the following basis:—

Art. 1.—The Association shall be called "The Saint John Seamen's Friend Society."

2.—Any person may become a member of the Society by the payment of Five Shillings annually.

3.—The object of this Society shall be to improve the condition of Seamen entering this Port in every way possible, especially in opening for them at an early day, a SAILOR'S HOME.

4.—The Officers of the Society shall be a President, one or more Vice Presidents, and twelve Directors; who shall appoint a Treasurer and Auditors.

5.—It shall be the duty of the Directors to appoint an Agent for collecting funds, and to employ the most suitable means for the promoting and carrying out the object of the Society.

On motion of Hon. John Robertson, seconded by F. A. Wiggins, Esq.:

Resolved, That Rev. Mr. Harris be appointed Agent, to solicit persons to become members of, and subscribe to, this Association—and when in his opinion a sufficient number of subscribers is obtained, to call a Meeting for the appointment of Officers; and that Rev. Mr. Scovil be requested to aid Rev. Mr. Harris in this duty.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Bill, seconded by Hon. John Robertson:

Resolved, That Rev. Mr. Scovil, Rev. Mr. Harris, and F. A. Wiggins, Esq., be requested to inquire whether a suitable place can be procured for a Sailor's Home, and at what cost; and to prepare a plan of the same, and also to ascertain whether a suitable person can be procured to take charge of the same,—and that these gentlemen be requested to report at the Meeting, when called.

And that the following gentlemen be requested to act as a Provisional Committee until office-bearers are appointed, viz:—Edward Allison, Esq., Hon. John Robertson, Hon. Charles Simonds, Messrs. F. A. Wiggins, John Owens, Nathan S. Demill, George Carvill, William Parks, George A. Lockhart, John Wishart, Charles Brown, William Olive, and William Wright, (Ship builder.)

After the usual vote of thanks to the Chairman, the Meeting separated, with the intention of assembling with others, who may become Members of the Society, at as early a day as possible.
