**Loss of Ship Cleopatra.**—The U. S. sloop-of-war Decatur, Commander Whittle, when off the coast of Newfoundland on the 27th ult., fell in with the ship Cleopatra, Capt. Leavitt, of this port, 24 days from Liverpool, for Quebec, in distress, with four feet of water in her hold. Two officers and a gang of men were put on board to assist the crew to keep her afloat and get her into Sydney, but on the night of the 28th, the wind blowing hard and a heavy sea running, she began to fill, and was made out from the Decatur, lying on her beam ends, with masts cut away, and on fire, from the burning of tar barrels as signals of distress. Commander Whittle, seeing that further efforts to save the ship would be useless, took off all hands with great difficulty, and landed them at Canso on the 3d inst. The ship foundered soon after she was abandoned.—The Cleopatra was a new ship of 1064 tons, on her first voyage, and was owned by Wm. Leavitt, Esq., of this City, where she was insured.

Ship Pedestrian, Soley, from Liverpool, for St. John, put into Milford Haven on the 21st August, leaky, having been struck by a heavy sea off Cape Clear.
