

duty of the Government. The Speaker, Messrs. Smith, Botsford, Johnson, McPhelim, Boyd and Ryan opposed pension. Messrs. Street, Gray, &c. supported amendment, denying that this would lead to a pension list. Occupied all day, with much warmth.

A statement, by Mr. Hatheway, that some members of Committee wished to lay a trap for Government, led to angry recrimination, as no gentleman would! Never would meet him on committee again, &c. He could take this as he asked!

Mr. Hatheway replied, &c. Resolution passed by a large majority, members of Government supporting. The amendment was proposed as a separate resolution. Attorney General acknowledged that he would pension these two officers provided it was necessary to an arrangement. Long discussion—final progress reported, which set the whole proceedings aside.

Grants to the Reporters which passed yesterday, rejected in Council, by the casting vote of Mr. Hazen, the Chairman of Committee.

Saturday, April 30.—House in Supply.—Granted £25 for mail route on Shepody road—£50 towards the erection of a Bridge on the Magaguadavic—£120 for the Packet to Grand Manan—£817 9s. for public Buildings in addition to £400 advanced by Government.

Rejected—Grant for a Road to Dark Harbor, for addition to the salary of the Postmaster at Shediac, for addition to the salary of the Librarian. The bill to amend the Revenue act was rejected in the Council yesterday.

Afternoon.—Supply closed—Grants passed—to Barry Phair, Clerk in Post Office, Fredericton, £30 additional salary; Post Master at Dalhousie £10 additional; Post Master, St. Stephens, £2 10s. additional; Peter Morrison & George Logie £31 extra rent paid for fishing Stations; Fish Warden at Restigouche £10 13s., expenses of 1852; Alexander Cook do; two Wardens in Charlotte £40 each for services in 1851; to McLaughlin, overseer of Fisheries, Grand Manan, for services several years, £30. Mr. Wilmet, late Attorney General, £60 balance of costs due him; late Attorney General Street £83, both sums recommended by the Committee; Silas McMann £50 to reimburse him expenses of Law Suit about Coals, &c.

Mr. Johnson moved the bill to amend the 14th Section of the Liquor Law—some discussion—adjournment moved and carried—Bill consequently thrown out. The Miramichi Telegraph Bill postponed for three months.—Yeas—Montgomery, Hayward, Scoullar, Lewis, Taylor, Jordan, Connell, McLeod, Purdy, Ryan, McPhelim, Boyd, Cutler, Earle, Goddard, McPherson, Gilbert, Harding, Needham.—Nays, Street, Williston, Johnson, Read, Kerr, Smith, English, Gray.

About 130 labourers arrived at St. Andrews some ten or twelve days ago, and have been set to work on the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway, by Messrs. Sykes and Co., who are determined to push the work forward with all possible despatch.

Towed into the Harbour on Tuesday last, from Ten Mile Creek, a finely modelled and substantially built Ship of 900 tons, built for Messrs. Morrisey & Shives, of this City. She was constructed by Messrs. Lovatt & Parker, of the best materials, and fully sustains the reputation of her experienced builders.—Nbr.

Launched, on Wednesday last, from the building yard of Mr. John Fisher, Lower Cove, a fine ship of 1000 tons register, named the *Pedestrian*. She is a first class seven years' ship, and is owned by the builder.

Another superb ship of 999 tons, N. M., called the *Utopia*, was launched on Monday, from the building yard of Mr. James Johnston, in Carleton.

We may state that most cheering letters have been received relative to the construction of railways in Nova Scotia. Mr. Beattie, the Government Engineer, [who came out in the last steamer] is now in Halifax, which he intends to make his head quarters.—Halifax Br. Colonist.

NOVA-SCOTIA.—The meeting summoned by Sir Gaspard Le Marchant, to further the improvement of Agriculture in this Province, took place yesterday at Mason's Hall. It was composed of the most influential portion of the community. It was truly pleasant to us to look down from the gallery upon an assemblage of men cordially united to promote the interests of the Province so long neglected. His Excellency deserves the thanks of all people, for thus presenting to them a subject free from the trammels of party. The Rev. Mr. Forrester addressed the meeting at some length in favor of the cultivation of the turnip as essential to the raising of good cattle, and the erection of warm winter barns and stables, by which at least one half of the necessary food is saved. A vote of thanks was passed to his Excellency for his attention to the interests of the country.—Halifax Colonist, 28th.

First Ship at Quebec.—The *Shandon*, an iron Clyde built ship, commanded by Captain Greig, arrived 24th inst, has the honor of being the first arrival from sea this season.—Quebec Chron.
