HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.—At the recent meeting of the Executive Council in this City, it was decided that there should be no dissolution of the House of Assembly this Fall. It will therefore be allowed to expire by its own legal limitation, after the next Session.

There is now a good prospect of having the Steam Boats on the route between Woodstock and Fredericton, in a few days, as rains have commenced in right earnest. We may also expect to see the new boat, now on the stocks here, in her native element in less than a week.—*Carleton Sentinel.*

FROM AUSTRALIA.—The barque Elizabeth, of Bristol, Capt. Churchill, arrived at this port on Sunday, in 93 days from Melbourne, bringing papers to the 15th of June.

The celebrated clipper ship Marco Polo sailed from Melbourne on the 8th June for Liverpool. A magnificent water-fall, 175 feet in perpendicular height, was discovered on a river called the Wannon.

A dispatch, announcing that convicts would be no more sent from England, caused the greatest enthusiasm, and the people were about to hold a jubilee to celebrate their deliverance from such a pest.

The morning papers are as large as the New York Herald, and filled with advertisements. These give a great insight into the social history of that strange country. For instance—one was an advertisement of a newly married couple seeking employment, the husband could take care of horses, and the wife teach Music, Drawing, French, and English.
