We cordially endorse their sentiments; and express our earnest hope, that neither the bullies, the arguments, nor the cajoleries of the Americans, will ever induce the Imperial Government to sacrifice the interests of these loyal Provinces, to any expediency or policy; and that our local Legislatures and Governments will, to the utmost of their power, oppose any such concession of sacrifice.—*Obs.*

ARREST OF A ROBBER.—On Sunday night, Constable George Stockford arrested a person in this City for having stolen a horse a few days previous at Houlton, and who gave his name as Kenneth Bigger. On examining his trunk, the watches stolen some weeks ago from the store of Mr. White, in Fredericton, were discovered. The robber has been lodged in Jail.—*New Brunswick.*

NEW SHIPS.—Towed into this port on Thursday last, from Granville, a very superior ship called the "Joseph Tarratt" of about 1000 tons register, built in Young's yard, under the special survey of Lloyd's surveyor, for Messrs J. & R. Wright, of this City, and is intended to run in their line of Liverpool packets. The projectors of this line are entitled to the highest praise for the energy they have displayed and the regularity and punctuality which have attended all their operations; and we understand, that in order to make their line as efficient as possible, and to meet the requirements of the trade of New-Branswick, they are now building two additional clipper ships for their Liverpool line, which will be launched about the last of the year, and that next year a ship will be despatched by them from Liverpool once every fortnight.

NOVEL LAUNCH.—On Wednesday last, a beautifully modelled and well-built Barge, called the "Nepenthe," was launched at Wellington Bay, the new building yard of Messrs. McLaughlin & Stackhouse, in Carleton. She was fully rigged on the stocks, and when launched had her sails all bent, ready for immediate use. After gliding into the water her sails were set and she passed up the harbour to her loading berth, in fine style. The "Nepenthe" is constructed of the best of hachmatac and pitch pine, is copper fastened, and will class 7 years. She is owned by her enterprising builders, who intend her for a regular packet between this City and the Clyde; and will be commanded by Capt Hatfield, at present of the packet brig Zetland.—*New Brunswick.*

The "Nepenthe" measures 196 tons, N. M., and 264 tons, O. M.

A fine Ship, called the "Matoaka," was recently towed down the river from the Oromocto, where she was built by Mr. J. W. Craig, for Messrs. MacCallum Brothers, of Liverpool, through their agent, E. Kaye, Esq. of this City. She measures 1226 tons, N. M. and 1323 tons, O. M., and her model and workmanship do great credit to the master builder, Mr. Samuel Smith.

Another handsome vessel, called the "Aquatio," measuring 446 tons N. M. and 483 tons, O. M. was recently towed over here from St. Mary's Bay, where she was built by S. Savory, Esq., for Messrs. McGivern and Seovil, of this City.—*Cour.*

RAILWAY LOCATION.—We learn that the first five miles of the road leading from the City, are being staked out; the line will follow close beside the Marsh Road, and will be fenced in immediately. It is rumoured that the depot will be situated a few yards West of the Abideau, for the accommodation of passengers, and that the Flats will be for the machinery houses. It is further rumoured that the whole line from Shediac to St. John will be completed by next Fall.—*News.*
