

Mrs. McKay, one of the women who were lost, was the wife of Mr. Andrew McKay, of Rogers' Hill, who is at present in Australia. The name of the other female is Jane Young; she is supposed to have been a servant of the Misses Dewolfe. The real name of the person mentioned as Thomas Hammil, was Thomas McGurgan; he formerly belonged to Pictou, but has for some years past resided in Charlottetown, and at the time of his death was on his way here to visit some of his friends.

Several articles of property belonging to the parties deceased have been washed ashore, on different parts of the coast, but nothing that we have yet heard of, belonging to any of the passengers saved, has been found. The trunks of Dr. McKenzie and the Misses Dewolfe have been found; an inventory of their contents has been taken, and the articles placed in safe keeping until they can be claimed by or forwarded to the friends of the deceased.

The only person who appears to have seen the ladies after the breaking up of the vessels was Mr. Cameron. He says:

"We were nearly all sitting together, except two or three who were aft. As she went over, the ladies went down, as I suppose. I and another man kept up, and got on her bottom, as it turned upwards. The others were all washed off. I took hold of the paddle box and wheel, as it was going over, but was washed off in a few minutes. I was in the water a few minutes, when I took hold of a piece of wood, it was so small it was of no use and I threw it away. I then got hold of what I thought was a part of the hurricane deck, and got upon it. I looked round and saw three ladies, two of them clinging together, the third was much exhausted; the two together were trying to reach some pieces of the wreck. A man whom I supposed to be Thomas Hammil who was near me on a small piece said he wanted to get on with me; I tried to reach him but a sea came and parted us, and I saw neither him nor the ladies again. I then saw Mr. Wilkins and others on a piece of the wreck for a little time, it might be ten minutes, when we parted and I saw no more of them."
