

**MEETING OF THE LEGISLATURE.**—The Royal Gazette of Wednesday last contains His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's Proclamation, summoning the Provincial Legislature to meet on Thursday the 24th of February next, for the dispatch of business.

On Tuesday evening last, three or four houses in Pond Street, York Point, were destroyed by fire—Mr. White's, in which the fire originated, occupied by six families; Mr. Fitz-Maurice's, occupied by four or five families; and Mr. Heber's, occupied by two families.—A Mrs. Cooper, who lived in White's house, melancholy to state, was burned or suffocated in the fire. Her remains were found, after the fire was extinguished, burnt almost to a cinder.—Verdict of the Coroner's Jury, on the body of the deceased—"Accidental Death by Burning."—Obs.

The store and house belonging to the heirs of the late Robert Ferguson, Esq., at Campbelltown, Restigouche, were destroyed by fire on the 29th ult.

**Communication with Prince Edward Island by Telegraph.**—Yesterday, the first telegraphic message from Charlottetown to Cape Tormentine, by the submarine cable, was received in this City. The message was forwarded from the Cape by Mr. Gaborne, who states his confident expectation that he will at the commencement of the year 1854, place this City in direct communication with St. John's Newfoundland.—*New Bruns.*
