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The Rothschilds, as security for a loan advanced to the Sultan.

THE DEATH OF MR. JOHN TOPE THE DIVER.—The Buffalo Republic gives the following account of the melancholy death of Mr. John Tope, while experimenting in submarine armor, the event was caused by neglect or ignorance of a simple and well-known principle in the working of the apparatus. At the depth of thirty feet, the pressure of the water is fifteen pounds to the square inch; and the flexible portion of the armor (i. e., all but the helmet) must be kept in an inflated state by the air-force pump, so long as the diver is below the surface, so as to maintain the equilibrium of pressure outward and inward, which relieves the diver of the weight of the water, on the same principle that we escape being oppressed by the weight of the atmosphere. At the same time, fresh air must be constantly circulated through the armor to support respiration. The apparatus is therefore provided with a spring valve for the escape of the air, so regulated as to permit its escape only at a certain density, thus keeping up at once, by the aid of the force-pump, the indispensable internal pressure, and the equally necessary change of air.

The unfortunate diver, in the recent case, resolved to try the effect of substituting for this restrictive outlet, a mere open pipe extending to the surface, and of course, leaving no pressure but that of the atmosphere, a little aggravated by the force-pump, to balance the combined pressure of the atmosphere and water. The consequence was, that on his descent, the weight of water instantly collapsed the flexible part of the armor, and imposed upon the whole surface of his body, a pressure of nearly fifteen pounds to the square inch, forcing the blood to the head, bursting the blood vessels, and causing immediate death. In a minute and a half from the time when he entered the water, he was raised upon the deck of the vessel, a frightful corpse—the blood oozing from his eyes, ears, nose and mouth. The appearance of the body below the neck was white and clear as a marble statue, indicating that the blood had been literally compressed out of it. He had descended thirty feet, but was undoubtedly dead before reaching that depth as the weight on the rope settling heavily, alarmed the men who held it and caused them to make a signal to the diver, which was not answered upon which they instantly drew him up.

IMPORTANT TO SHIP OWNERS.—The board of Underwriters at a meeting held yesterday—all the Companies being represented unanimously decided that hereafter "no policy should be issued on any vessel engaged in Foreign trade, or on the freight of such vessel, unless containing the clause 'Warranted not to carry Grain in bulk.'" Had such a determination been reached six months ago many lives and much valuable property would undoubtedly have been saved. It is a step in the right direction.—N. Y. Courier.

THE FISHERY AND RECIPROCITY TREATY.

—The *New Brunswick* of yesterday says:—We are to-day enabled to state, that on Tuesday last the long-debated Treaty relative to reciprocal trade between the United States and these Provinces was actually signed on behalf of H. M. Government and of the United States. This treaty will, in the first instance, require the confirmation of the Senate of the United States, and if there ratified, will then be submitted to the Colonies severally, for their approval or rejection.

THUNDER STORM.—Last evening we were visited with a sudden and heavy, but brief thunder storm, with rain. One peal of thunder was really tremendous and awful, and instantaneously followed one of the most fearful flashes of lightning we ever witnessed. The electric fluid came down in a magnificently forked and zigzag stream, and with almost blinding brilliancy. We understand that it struck a house on Brussels Street, shattering the chimney, breaking a stove, and injuring a man, named Judge, besides doing other damage. We shall not be surprised to hear of other mischief, elsewhere, from this brief but dangerous storm.—Obs.

SHIPWRECKED PASSENGERS.—About one hundred of the passengers by the "Helén Thomson" landed at Richibucto, arrived here on Thursday from the Bend, and were on Friday forwarded by the Emigration Officer by the steamer "Admiral" to Portland, whence they will be sent by railway to Montreal. There were in all about 165 landed at Richibucto, some of whom have remained there, and others have obtained employment here at the Cathedral as masons and stone cutters.—Nbr.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Times states that there is reason to suspect that Russia will ere long offer the United States tempting bribes for its alliance, including repeal of all duties on American products imported into Russia, and the offering of liberal bounties on some important articles.—Ib.

We understand that it has been determined to discontinue the collection at the Treasury of the One per Cent. (loan) duty on manufactured articles, and that all the duties collected on that account since the loan was paid off will be refunded.—Courier.
