" In the evening of April 21st, General d'Osten Sacken having made no answer to our summons, the attack was resolved upon for the next morning. Pursuant to combinations adopted by Admi-Dundas and myself in concert, the two French frigates le Vauban, Captain d'Herbinghen; le Descartes, Captain Daricau; together with the two English frigates Tiger, Captain Giffard; and Marble, and Free Stones Chimney Pieces and Sampson, Captain Jones, the senior of this division Centre Tables. arrived at half-past six in the morning, within nine theirs. When the firing had continued an hour and a half, the Vauban received three red hot shot, one of which broke some spokes of her paddle wheels, and the other set fire to her windward side ; the pumps were had recourse to to extinguish the fire, but in vain; one of the red hot cannon balls had penetrated the outward coating of her timbers, and was slowly burning internally. [The Vanban is withdrawn for a short time to repair damage.]

A little while afterwards the second division of they began to execute these orders with vigor .-The shells from the seven frigates fell like bail upon the battery of the Imperial port, and the warehouses and ships they contained. Very serious symptoms of conflagration begin to show themselves already. Batteries established on the Odessa heights join their fire to that of the guns of the Imperial port. Not far from the frigate, six English shallops approach the port on the northwest quarter of the Mole, where the enemy has no guns, and throw a great number of Congreve rockets, which appear to produce a very good Head Stones, Monuments, Tomb Tables, Chimney effect.

The work of destruction of the Imperial port goes on rapidly under the redoubled blows from the business. the frigates which take advantage of the confusion produced on land by the blowing up of the powder magazine to advance two cables' length nearer the shore, the better to destroy some fifteen Russian ships ensconced in the harbor. While they thus advance nearer to the batteries of the commercial port, these batteries which had ceased firing for an instant, recommence pretty smartly and are supported by mortars on the heights : but the frigates, nevertheless, do not slacken their work of destruction, and emulate each other in the accuracy of their evolutions and firing, sometimes fighting at anchor, and sometimes while in motion. 
