

BOMBARDMENT OF ODESSA.

The following is an extract from the despatch of the French Admiral Hamelin, dated on board the ship Ville de Paris, in Odessa Roads, April 21, giving the particulars of the bombardment and destruction of the military post of that city.

In the evening of April 21st, General d'Osten Sacken having made no answer to our summons, the attack was resolved upon for the next morning.

When the firing had continued an hour and a half, the Vauban received three red hot shot, one of which broke some spokes of her paddle wheels, and the other set fire to her windward side.

A little while afterwards the second division of four steam frigates received orders to support the three others first engaged, and toward half-past ten they began to execute these orders with vigor.

It is noon, the Vauban, having extinguished the fire, has just left the squadron to rejoin the other French and English frigates which rival each other in ardor, and the excellence of their fire.

At one o'clock the warehouses and barracks of the Imperial port are all in flames. The burning roofs fall in. Almost at the same moment the powder magazine on the port battery blows up.

The work of destruction of the Imperial port goes on rapidly under the redoubled blows from the frigates which take advantage of the confusion produced on land by the blowing up of the powder magazine to advance two cables' length nearer the shore, the better to destroy some fifteen Russian ships ensconced in the harbor.
