THE QUEEN'S PIPER.—Mr. Kay, her Majesty's
piper, has gone out of his mind, and the symptoms
are such as to leave no hope of his recovery. The
lamentable fact first indicated itself when he wrote
a rambling incoherent letter to Colonel Phipps
(privy purse) in which he stated that he was in
possession of important documents which clearly
proved him to be the right and lawful heir to the
throne; but as he had no wish to dethrone Queen
Victoria, he demanded an interview with the gal-
lant colonel. This was granted, and, on the man's
making his appearance at the Castle, he was im-
mediately put under restraint. Of course he will
be sent away and provided for, but it is not yet
known whether the Queen will appoint his suc-
cessor. Mr. Kay was allowed to be the first piper
in Scotland. His duty was to play before the
Queen and royal suite when at dinner, and at the
dancing of the Scotch reels. It is a somewhat re-
markable coincidence that Smith the policeman
on duty at the north entrance to the Castle, went
stark mad on the same day, and has since been
constantly imitating the barking of a dog. His
death is hourly expected.

Kalafat is a town of 2,000 houses—is surround-
ed with walls, has a quarantine, a town-hall, a
custom-house, three churches, and cavalry bar-
racks. It is the chief place of a sub-administrator's
district. The doubts raised by the Turks are of
great extent, and very strong. They are partly
raised on two high hills in the plain of Kalafat,
about a mile distant from each other, and have a
numerous artillery. All the neighbouring country
is commanded by these hills in such a way that
no approach to the Danube can be made. In 1828
these hills were occupied and fortified by the Rus-
sians. Between Widdin and Kalafat the Danube
is little less than a mile wide, and the course of it
is very rapid. The island in which the Turks are

fortified is situated near the left bank; it is partly
covered with wood, and is defended by strong in-
trenchments in earth, bearing large artillery.—
Above Widdin the Turks have constructed a new
citadel according to all the rules of art.
